President's Report



Welcome to this autumn edition of the Beaconsfield Banner. The Banner is available on our BPA website www.beaconsfield.org.au and printed copies are available from a number of local businesses including the Beaconsfield Post Office. Hopefully you have been able to have a restful and enjoyable break over Christmas and New Year. Most activities are now back in full swing. If possible, involve yourselves in community groups, events and activities as Beaconsfield has much to offer.

Currently, the important local issue is the Level Crossing Removal Project (LXRP) and, in particular, the level crossing at Station Street, Beaconsfield. The BPA has informed the community at our meetings and by various online posts and by printed material and organised a public meeting with the LXRP and also made various representations to the LXRP.

The LXRP have stated their preferred option for a route diagonally south from the Goff Street, Beaconsfield Avenue and Station Street intersection through the Old Railway House property (proposed to be compulsorily acquired and demolished), then an overpass bridge across the railway line and Kenilworth Avenue, and then joining a new roundabout at Kenilworth Avenue.

The BPA supports a group of local residents who have protested the proposed demolition of the Old Railway House. In particular, they have used social media, websites and other ways to publicise the possible loss of the Old Railway House and Bunya Bunya tree both noted as having Heritage significance by a report for Cardinia Shire Council.

The loss of the house and tree would occur if the Minister of Planning approved the Project's preferred option. The Group has organised a petition to save the Old Railway House and Bunya Bunya tree and our Association supports the petition.

The BPA was successful in obtaining a 2022/2023 Cardinia Shire Council beautification grant of \$2,000 which will be used for a seat in Beaconsfield Park. The BPA reviews grants available from the local Council, State, and Federal Governments that have a positive effect on the wellbeing of Beaconsfield residents. The BPA appreciates any financial assistance received.

Unfortunately, the outdoor drive-In movie planned for Australia Day 2023 was not able to be held due to insufficient number of people to run and manage the event.

However, planning is well underway for the ANZAC Memorial Service to be held at the Beaconsfield War Memorial on Sunday, 23rd of April commencing at 2pm. A grant will be received from Cardinia Shire Council to cover the costs of this event.

Both grant programs assist community groups to improve community and recreational facilities, as well as help establish new organisations, projects and services within Cardinia Shire.

Applications for these grant programs close 5pm, Friday 31 March 2023.

About the Community Capital Works Grant Program

This program assists community groups to improve community and recreational facilities to support community networks and enhance community wellbeing.

The Community Capital Works Grant Program is made up of 3 categories:

- **Community Capital Works Grants** support community and recreational facility upgrade works that fall into one of 4 priority areas. Council manage works on behalf of community groups. Community groups are not required to provide matched funding.
- **Community Capital Works Partnership Grants** are available for community and recreational facility upgrade works that fall into one of 3 priority areas. Community groups manage the works with guidance from Council and must provide a matched funding amount based on their annual income.
- **Major Equipment Grants** support major equipment purchases that fall into one of 3 priority areas. Equipment purchases are used to help maintain sporting grounds, outer grounds or large internal areas. Community groups must provide dollar-for-dollar matched funding.

About the Wellbeing Support Grant Program

This program helps to establish new organisations, projects and services. It also funds initiatives that improve residents' health and wellbeing, support opportunities for volunteering, as well as those which help to build the capacity of community groups, projects and programs to be sustainable.

Wellbeing Support Grants Program funding categories are:

- **Seeding grants** to support the cost of starting a new organisation, group, club, program, project or service.
- **Volunteering grants** to help create volunteering programs, train volunteers or promote volunteering opportunities.
- **Small change grants** to assist with a range of ad hoc costs that cannot be met through other funding sources, such as buying small items of equipment, website redevelopment, Christmas decorations and more.

Green Waste Drop Off Events

Council's free green waste drop-off events help Cardinia Shire residents to clean up and reduce the fire fuel load on their properties.

Council's green waste drop-off events are a free service accepting residential amounts of green waste including garden prunings, tree branches and trunks (up to 30 centimetres wide and 1 metre long), weeds, grass clippings, leaves, and flowers.

Residents must present photo ID as proof of residence within Cardinia Shire to access the free service.

Waste will only be accepted from residential vehicles and trailers; commercial business operators cannot use this service.

Neville Muir Recognised in Australia Day Honours

The late Reverend Neville Muir, a resident of Beaconsfield for almost 20 years, has been made a Member (AM) in the General Division of the Order of Australia in this year's Australia Day Honours List. He was awarded this honour for "significant service to the deaf community, and to international Christian ministry".

Neville's interest in the deaf began as a child. He trained as a teacher of the deaf, and when he decided to sponsor a child through World Vision, he specifically requested a deaf child to sponsor. He was assigned a deaf boy in Korea.

After a number of letters to his sponsor child, Neville was able to visit him and his family on a trip to Korea. His sponsor child's mother told him that there was no church available for her son in sign language, and she begged him to help. Eventually Neville was able to move to Korea and start a deaf church, with his sponsor child as one of the initial four members of that church.

Neville was a large man, with an even bigger heart. As he heard more and more of the situation of deaf people around the world, he was moved to help. Neville went on to found Deaf Ministries International, an organisation that works in twenty-one countries across the globe to provide education, employment, and churches for deaf people. Deaf Ministries International has its headquarters in Pakenham, along with its sister organisation, Deaf Action, which operates the education and child sponsorship activities.

Neville spent a lot of time travelling in Asia, Africa, and the Middle East, touching lives and making friends everywhere he went. He would tell many stories of deaf children in remote villages who had never learnt sign language, and who did not even know their own name. All of these children were

offered the chance of education. On one occasion, Neville was travelling in Zambia and was told about a young deaf man in prison. He went out of his way to check in on him, and made a point of visiting him whenever he was in Zambia. Neville became convinced that this man had been framed for

murder by relatives, and began petitioning for him to be given an appeal. Last year, this deaf man was finally pardoned and released. This is an example of Neville's great compassion. He cared deeply about the people he met and would do whatever he could for them.



Neville never let lack of resources deter him, he always believed that God would provide, and would plough ahead with new projects wherever he saw the need, focussed on what he could do to help. Although this drove more practically minded colleagues crazy, Neville's faith and compassion usually turned out to be justified, and projects such as new school buildings, farms, churches, and food relief programs have been able to bless deaf people and their families around the world.

Neville passed away from aggressive prostate cancer in November 2020. He is survived by his wife Lill, and his four sons, three daughters-in-law, and ten grandchildren, and remembered with love by thousands of people around the world. It is wonderful that his legacy has been acknowledged with this honour.

The Ongoing Fight to Save the Historical Railway House From Demolition

The Summer Edition of the *Beaconsfield Banner* included an article about the Level Crossing Removal Project in Station St Beaconsfield announcing that in order to build a road bridge over the railway the much-loved Railway House would be acquired and demolished, together with the protected Bunya Bunya tree adjacent to the property.

My last article began with this question; *"What will Beaconsfield look like without the Railway House?"*

Were you able to imagine that? Were you saddened? Were you angry?

Our 'call to arms' was responded to, and so many people were moved, or angered enough, to ask what they could do. There were many ways you could voice your concern and the petition at [change.org](https://www.change.org) now has 1290 signatures and there are more on paper.

Our Facebook page 'Save The Railway House' has 201 members and it is a good way to see what has been happening. Things were quiet over the Christmas/New Year break but we are back and we are writing, emailing, questioning, and finding support where we can.

The comments and feeling are 100% behind us in our efforts to save the beautiful Railway House, as well as the bunya-bunya pine which is on the significant tree register. It too will be felled to allow for the road bridge.

Here is a small sample of your comments posted online...

"History deserves to be protected"


"We should preserve our history. It is who we are and what we have become. Our past is our foundation to move forward. This is a building worth saving with all its grace and warmth that wraps around you as you enter her domain."

"You don't get rid of beautiful history just for a road....."

"It breathes Beaconsfield"

"We need to keep our history alive with these buildings that are so magnificently restored"

"First the historic post office, then the reservoir, now this! We must protect & maintain our historic buildings"



Had Ian Cole not so expertly researched, renovated, painted, created and restored this house back to its original glory we would never have known what it looked like back in the day when horses and carts rumbled up and down the busy streets of Beaconsfield going about their business. He saw it and appreciated it and had a vision for what it could be again. He succeeded beyond expectations and should be rightly proud of what he, and his wife Yvonne achieved. They passed the baton on to Linda and Brandon who loved it at first sight and now consider themselves custodians of the Railway House to preserve it for future generations. Little did they guess how they would be

challenged to hang onto it, not just for their family and their livelihood, but for all of us who love this grand lady. It is a challenging and stressful time for them as they also run their business from the property. They are living in limbo and dealing with Government bureaucrats for whom this is only a job and who seem to have become so desensitised to the fallout of these projects that they fail to grasp the very real and serious implications these announcements create for the family. They are ongoing, life changing and, in this case, unnecessary, as we have shown.

We maintain that this crossing is neither congested or dangerous. In fact, we have seen a decrease in flow since the opening of the O'Shea Rd extension which allows motorists to cross into Berwick and Clyde Rd. The new exit and entrance on the Pakenham Bypass means there are other options that motorists are obviously making use of to save time. We are unable to get the data from a traffic count carried out just before Christmas and would be interested to see how much it has changed since the initial one. The underpass remains a favoured route to cross under the rail line.

The Station Street crossing is at 110 on ALCAM's list of Victoria's crossings by risk. There are much more dangerous and congested crossings desperate to be improved. We do not dispute that LXP save lives but some are more worthy of removal than others.

So, what have we done?

We have learned a lot and been frustrated by the lack of response from any responsible Government department, especially those whose role it is to respond to queries, concerns and provide information.

We have been encouraged by those who support and offer to help.

We have been discouraged when we hear people say "You'll never win" or when those who have travelled this road before us tell of their anger and frustration and ultimately their failure to achieve anything. Even with all their advice and contacts I feel we have made very little progress but we continue to advocate and question.

This is our journey so far

- We heard the news
- Talked with neighbours and affected persons
- Decided we HAD to do something
- Filled in the survey from LXP and spread the word
- Went to BPA meeting to hear from LXP but they didn't show, later we had a Zoom meeting that was very disappointing
- Organised flyers for a letterbox drop and posters for businesses and all were very happy to display
- Arranged for a board for the front of the Railway House to get word out there, thank you Amanda Charles at Kaye Charles Real Estate for not

hesitating when I requested it, it continues to do the job of promoting our cause. I often see passers by stopping to read it.

- Set up an online petition at www.change.org/SaveRailwayHouse which currently has 1290 signatures.
- Set up a FB page to communicate information Save The Railway House and it currently has 201 members.
- Wrote the article for the Summer edition of *Beaconsfield Banner*.
- Went to a Council Meeting in November and asked the following question(s).

“Does Council have any concerns regarding the LXP in Station St Beaconsfield given that the plans include acquiring an historically significant building namely Railway House at 20 Beaconsfield Ave in order to construct a bridge over rail.”

Answer from the General Manager Infrastructure and Environment:

“Council recognises the value of Station Masters House and tree to the community as heritage significance. We are aware of the community’s concerns and recognise how crucial it is to make an effort to protect this heritage property. Council is considered a stakeholder in the design process and will seek to influence outcomes although will not be final decision maker this will be the Minister for Planning who will determine the outcome of the project. In the formal engagement for the project Council has provided a submission alongside the community’s submissions emphasising the importance of protection of this heritage site and will continue to advocate for the best outcome for the

community.”

- Also asked about environmental concerns of building a road in the Cardinia Creek Wetlands

“There are further concerns by the community about the intention of LXP to encroach into the Cardinia Creek Wetlands, which therefore has the potential to damage and threaten flora and fauna in the area. The land in question is currently flooded.”

Answer from the General Manager Infrastructure and Environment:

“Council also recognises the environmental sensitivities in the area in terms of flooding, flora and fauna of the area. These projects are required under both Federal and State legislation to consider the environmental impacts of the area. Council has, and will continue to, advocate for best outcomes in a difficult and tightly constrained design area and still deliver a much-needed project for the travelling community of Beaconsfield and surrounding areas whilst minimising the impact on environmental sensitive areas. Council will seek to collaborate throughout the design processes to advocate for the careful consideration to limit the impact to the area.”

- In his speech to Parliament 20/12/22 Brad Battin informed Members about the Railway House, pleaded our cause and invited the Minister to visit. Brad continues to advocate for the Railway House and keeps us updated despite being busy in the electorate, many thanks to him and his team. He always replies to emails and we appreciate this communication.

- Sent an email to LXP Team and received the following reply from Kevin Devlin after quite some time which, in part, states:

“As you have noted, this design necessitates the acquisition of one residential property. The decision to acquire private homes is never taken lightly and the Project is working closely with the owner throughout the acquisition process. It is acknowledged that this house was also formerly the Station Masters House associated with Beaconsfield Station. All the relevant planning approvals will be sought from the Minister for Planning before the Project proceeds. However, it should be noted that the property has been assessed by experts in the field and does not feature on the State’s Heritage Register, due in part to the fact that the house has been significantly modified since its original construction.

“Nevertheless, the Project team understands the community’s attachment to the property and is working to identify opportunities to retain certain historical elements. The Project team will continue to work with Council and the community on these opportunities as the project is further developed.”

- Had an article published in the *Pakenham Gazette* on 23/11/22.
- Manned a stall at Akoonah Park Market to spread the word and get more signatures.
- All residents received an update from LXP with results of their survey to the community to tell us

what we value i.e. flora and fauna, village-like feel and pathways and connections. Sadly, no mention of our concerns that we know we raised time and again.

- Sent an email (8/2/23) detailing our concerns and questions to all stakeholders and decision makers including Jacinta Allan (Minister for Construction) Sonya Kilkenny (Planning Minister) LXP team and leadership et al. Currently no responses except from Brad Battin and one automated reply.

- Currently in discussion with various people who have offered to have meetings and discussions about helping and we are awaiting the results of these.

- Applied for an Interim Protection Order on Railway House. Waiting on a decision.

- News breaks about the Government not being transparent about LXP statistics and priorities, which could very well apply to us.

- Have had an offer from Joe Toscano from Radio 3CR to dedicate a show to the Railway House.

- The *Pakenham Gazette* will be running an article again soon.

- Held a Public Meeting from 7.30pm 21/2/23 at the beginning of the Beaconsfield Progress Association February meeting. We invited all Cardinia Councillors and other interested parties to give an update as to what has been happening.

This meeting was attended by 50+ interested people, not just locals, also from Upper Beaconsfield and Berwick. Cr Brett Owen and Cr Graeme Moore attended, with apologies from Cr Kaye Cameron and Cr Stephanie Davies who emphasised their support for the Railway House. Brad Battin was in Parliament

but sent his apologies also. I gave an update as to what has been happening. Ian Cole spoke about his journey restoring the Railway House while the current owner, Linda, very bravely spoke to us about the uncertainty her family is facing and the toll this is taking. As she spoke through tears she showed her determination to ensure this house is kept for Beaconsfield because it means as much to the community as it does to them. Cr Brett Owen assured us of the support Council will give us and that they will continue to strongly advocate for the Railway House and will ensure they keep discussing design options with LXP personnel. There is a closed meeting planned for 20 March and he is happy to put any of your questions to them at this meeting.

Our stance hasn't changed, we aim to save the Railway House for the owners, for Beaconsfield, and in the interests of common sense.

The hardest part has been getting any responses from the powers that be. Throughout this all we have been respectful, patient, but determined. We have raised more than valid points, done research, explored every possibility that we know of and will continue to pursue every avenue we can.

Foremost we do not want to be aggressive, disrespectful or confrontational, but to be honest I can understand how it comes to that when you keep hitting brick walls.

Last time I looked we lived in a democracy where we are all equal, where it is actually our tax that pays for this, so in theory, we should have the right to question. I admit to being very discouraged as time goes by. I see machines arriving and I break out in a cold sweat when I see workers in high vis vests and wonder if this is the day of no return. We feel the hopes of all of you behind us, what a responsibility!

Where to from here??

We will submit questions to Brett Owen to put to LXP at their meeting on 20/2/23 and trust that the Council will be proactive in ensuring all options are considered.

We will keep trying to find out information for you.

We will continue to reach out on social media for people who can assist us and will use it to let you all know of any and all developments.

We will explore the idea of the radio show to get word out there.

We will stay positive, determined, and persist in our endeavours to save the Railway House.

We thank you for your support and encouraging comments every day.

In closing I will finish with a quote from Brad Battin's speech to Parliament late last year.

"I think it is paramount that we protect this house as a priority for the Beaconsfield community"



Australian Plant Society moves to Pakenham By Wendy Smart

APS-Wilson Park (Berwick) Inc. has become APS Cardinia Region Inc.

Over many months the APS-Wilson Park (Berwick) group had been forced to consider the viability of the group continuing or winding up.

Membership had fallen to 14 people with most being in an older age group making organising any activities difficult. Four of our committee were octogenarians.

Our committee examined the option of amalgamation with another APS Vic group, but the nearest groups are invariably some distance and travel time from our Berwick base.

We were aware that over the past few years the Deep Creek Reserve at Pakenham has become the most vibrant environmental centre in the south east area of greater Melbourne. Being just 12km from Berwick the committee decided to shift our group there anticipating interest could generate recruitment of new members.

Deep Creek Reserve was created by Cardinia Council in conjunction with the Pakenham Golf Club and the Cardinia Environment Coalition (CEC).

CEC has operated an indigenous nursery on various sites for 20 years. Now that nursery is established in excellent facilities funded by the Cardinia Council with support from the local philanthropic Andrews Foundation. More than 20 volunteers are actively involved in the nursery. The nursery is open to the public on Friday mornings.

On Saturday 28th May 2022 we held a “Re-Launch” of our group in the Functions Room at Deep Creek Reserve with speakers being APS-Vic President Chris Clarke, Vice-President Miriam Ford and John Arnott, Manager of Horticulture, Cranbourne Gardens of

RBGV. Fifty people attended the launch, several joined on the day and many more expressed interest through Facebook. We are excited that, by now, we now have 35 paid memberships.

At a special general meeting members adopted the name “Australian Plants Society Cardinia Region Inc.” Our

group will operate as APS Cardinia Region Inc.

The name was chosen to represent a wide area embracing Cardinia and Casey Councils and many vegetation classes in the southern Yarra Ranges and across the Gippsland Plain.

Meetings will continue on the second Tuesday of each month commencing at 7.30pm in the Functions Room at Deep Creek Reserve, 62 Cameron Way, Pakenham. New members are always welcome.

For more than 20 years APS-Wilson Park

(Berwick) conducted an Annual Plant Sale until suspended by Covid19 restrictions. Now we have booked to hold our 2023 plant sale undercover at Akoonah Park, Princes Hwy, Berwick on Saturday 2nd September 2023.

Berwick-Pakenham Historical Society By Penny Harris Jennings

The Berwick -Pakenham Historical Society was founded in 1961. The Society and Museum includes collections from all the towns within the “Shire of Berwick”, the Shire was proclaimed on 12 May 1868. (Now Shire of Cardinia and City of Casey)

The Shire in 1961 included Beaconsfield, Beaconsfield Upper, Berwick, Bunyip, Cockatoo, Cora Lynn, Doveton, Garfield, Gembrook, Hallam, Harkaway, Iona, Koo Wee Rup (and North), Maryknoll, Nar Nar Goon (and North), Narre Warren (and North), Officer, Pakenham, Pakenham Upper, Rythdale, Tonimbuk, Toomuc Valley, Tynong and Vervale.

The Society and Museum are now situated in the Historic Council Chambers situated at 85 Princes Highway, Pakenham.

The collection is far more extensive than just Berwick and Pakenham including many items from Beaconsfield and Officer. There are donations from many local residents. The collection is diverse and eclectic, containing items such as house or business objects, garments, memorabilia, ephemera, maps, posters, photographs and more.

Examples that pertain to Beaconsfield include the following;



- The Beaconsfield Football Club, Grand Presentation Ball Poster from Friday 23 September, 1955. This was a community highlight with a “Star vocalist”, an orchestra and supper being served.

Club Gymkhana advertisement when the racecourse was next to the Central Hotel.

- Clearing Sale posters from the 1800 ‘s and 1900’s are included in the collection. These posters give an insight into properties, homes, furniture and function of local farms.



- The photograph collection includes a large framed



photograph of bullocks mowing beside the Central Hotel, the image depicts bullocks with hard working men and a ploughing machine in action.

- On display is Kath and Morris Brownfield ‘s cutlery canteen that was presented to them from the Officer Patriotic Society on the occasion of their wedding.

- 8 May 1943. A gift from Graeme Brownfield.

There are many local history publications for sale at the Museum. Last

year a new book, *Pakenham - Then and Now* by secretary Audrey Dodson was published. Cardinia Shire hosted a launch at Pakenham Cultural Centre.

This year Audrey was the recipient of the Cardinia Shire Council Australia Day Award, Senior Citizen of the Year. Audrey is a well-known local resident as she taught at both Beaconsfield State School and Pakenham Consolidated School and has previously written the Beaconsfield State School history book.

To view the collection the society and museum are open each Sunday afternoon 2-4:30pm, 85 Princes Highway, Pakenham.


I know grass maintenance in the town is also a continuing concern and one I am still discussing with Council and the state government in ensuring Beaconsfield is looking its best.


Cardinia Shire Senior Citizen of the Year




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
