

President's Report



Welcome to this winter edition of the Beaconsfield Banner. The Banner is available on our BPA website www.beaconsfield.org.au and printed copies are available from a number of local businesses including the Beaconsfield Post Office.

The most significant local issue we are dealing with is the Level Crossing Removal Project (LXRP) and, in

particular, the Level Crossing at Station Street, Beaconsfield. This project identified the potential losses of the heritage Bunya Bunya tree as well as the heritage Railway House built circa 1888 located at 20 Beaconsfield Avenue. The LXRP have maintained their preferred option for a route diagonally south from Goff Street, Beaconsfield Avenue, and Station Street intersection through the Old

Railway House property (to be compulsorily acquired) with an overpass bridge across the railway line and Kenilworth Avenue and then joining a new roundabout at Kenilworth Avenue. A group of local residents have protested the proposed demolition of the house and loss of the Bunya Bunya tree. BPA has supported this group's actions by way of social media posts, publicity and obtaining signatories for the petition. BPA has provided free publicity including extra print of the Beaconsfield Banners. The Save the Railway House & Bunya Bunya Tree Facebook Group arranged a picnic on site. Approximately 50 people attended including Michael Galea MP, the former and current owners of the Railway House, Radio 3CR host Joe Toscano.

Some people travelled considerable distances to hear about the proposed demolition and loss of the tree. On a positive note, the State Government has advised that the heritage significant parts of the Railway House will be saved as will the Bunya Bunya tree. LXRP has released drawings of the project and they sought residents' views on what is proposed including the new overhead bridge. We arranged a public meeting on Zoom on 19th April for people to discuss with LXRP their views on the project. We need the community to continue advocacy on this project to obtain a favourable outcome for the area.

There is a new table and bench seat erected at Beaconsfield Park and they look good and will be appreciated by people having a picnic whilst using

> the park. This project was undertaken under a "Covid Period" grant. A separate grant of \$2,000 has been received from Cardinia Shire Council for a bench seat on a concrete base which will be located in the **Berwick Views** Estate near the lakes and the entrance to the shops.

Further landscape plans have been released for Bonette Reserve and Cardinia Shire

Council has received feed-back. A further on-site meeting has been held by BPA and Cardinia Shire Officers and a Councillor. This project which is opposite the Woods Street Kindergarten will beautify this area.

BPA held the Anzac Memorial Service at the Beaconsfield War Memorial on Sunday 23rd April. The format was similar to previous years commencing with a march preceding the service along Woods Street from the Beaconsfield CFA Station to the War Memorial. Afternoon tea was served at Beaconsfield Kindergarten. Approximately 120 people attended the service including politicians representing our area, namely Jason Wood MP, Brad



Battin MP and Michael Galea MP as well as Cardinia Shire Councillors Mayor Cr Tammy Radford and Cr Brett Owen. The Memorial Address about the McNaughton Brothers was written by Penny Harris Jennings and was read by Cr Brett Owen. It was pleasing to see the community come together again and help make this event successful. A grant was received from Cardinia Shire Council to pay for this event.

Recently Melbourne Water undertook a letterbox drop in Beaconsfield updating the Beaconsfield Dam Safety Upgrade Project. Melbourne Water have maintained their position that the partial upgrade option remains their preference and are proceeding with the project. The project scope includes:

- * Partial reduction in the dam wall height
- * Slow drawdown of the water level over 3 years
- * Removal of redundant infrastructure
- * Construction of a secondary spillway with a rock lined channel
- * Decommission the high-level outlet function

This partial upgrade option was supported by our Association in all our submissions including to Melbourne Water. It is noted that this announcement only deals with the dam safety. Public access issues will be addressed by the Department of Energy, Environment and Climate Action.

The Cardinia Shire Mayor's Volunteers Reception and Stan Henwood Award Ceremony was held on Thursday 18 May. The event acknowledged the contributions by volunteers. Congratulations to the winner of the Stan Henwood Award and to those nominated for the award.

Preliminary works have been carried out on Fieldstone Boulevard under the LATM program. Road humps and speed cushion devices have been installed after community consultation.

2023 Cardinia Community Leadership Program

Applications are now open for the 2023 Cardinia Community Leadership Program.

This fully funded program provides up to 22 participants with an opportunity to build or enhance their leadership skills and networks, and learn from a host of guest speakers, local leaders and program alumni.

This program covers topics to help participants build their capacity as leaders within their local neighbourhoods, groups or organisations.

If you are someone who guides, motivates and inspires others, keeps a team together and united in working towards a common goal, or aspires to do this in the future, then this program is for you. Residents are encouraged to apply for this incredible opportunity.

The course runs from July to December 2023 and is designed to prepare participants for success in their community leadership roles. The program encompasses learning through a diverse range of methods, so that participants can learn more about themselves, others and their community in their pursuit to lead more effectively.

Places in the 2023 program are limited to 22 participants. To be eligible, applicants must be:

2022-23 Footpath Program

As part of the 2022-23 Footpath program, council is constructing 5 new footpaths across the shire.

The 2022-23 Footpath program is fully funded by council and focuses on building new footpaths to

connect missing footpath links in established townships.

One of the new paths included in the program was Fieldstone Boulevard, Beaconsfield which had a 1.5m wide concrete path constructed.

Additional footpath projects are currently being undertaken in council-managed parks and reserves and new paths are provided by developers in the urban growth corridor.

Green waste drop off



Throughout the year, council holds free green waste drop off days for Cardinia Shire residents. The next drop offs will be in May and July

Green waste can be dropped off in residential vehicles and trailers only. Commercial business operators cannot use the service.

You need to bring Photo ID that shows your home address in Cardinia Shire.

The green waste is shredded and taken to a composting facility. It is then broken down and turned into high-quality soil conditioner to help grow food and gardens in Victoria.

Beaconsfield Level Crossing Projects Brunt Road Level Crossing Removal Project:

 The project has commenced. There has been some vegetation removal within the last couple



of weeks with some earthworks preparation for the bridge, and some further demolition works proposed in the next couple of weeks. The community can expect to see some construction equipment near the railway line by the end of the month.

- Several new indented bus bays with pedestrian links have been provided on Brunt Road near Rix Road and are currently in use.
- Council has awarded a contract for the construction of Pioneer Way and Brunt Road intersection upgrade including a new roundabout and the full extension of Pioneer Way and works will commence soon.
- Connection for all traffic onto the new road bridge over the railway is due for 2024, with full construction and landscaping due to be completed 2025.

Station Street, Beaconsfield Level Crossing Removal Project:

- The project will now retain the Railway House and Bunya Bunya Pine after strong advocacy from the community and Council. LXRP have shared some revised layouts of the carparking areas with concept designs on the Big Build website, however the State Government are committed to the bridge over rail solution. The construction of the new road bridge will impact on parts of the heritage building and LXRP have committed to retain key historical elements and have noted the more detailed design will progress in 2023.
- The feedback received from the final round of community consultation will help shape the final designs with LXRP to report about the feedback in the near future. Council is working with LXRP to influence the design of elements like landscaping, colours and finishes on the road bridge, interface with Council assets and pedestrian and cyclist connections.
- To date on site, only services and geotechnical investigations have taken place with more detailed design progressing, with major construction to start late in 2023.

We encourage residents and community members to sign up to the SMS service which provides updates on disruptions and closures in the area.

Railway House Saved!

Congratulations to the Beaconsfield community for your successful advocacy that has led to the retention of the historic Railway House and the Bunya Bunya tree.

As you know, the Andrews Labor Government has commenced planning for the removal of the Beaconsfield level crossing at Station Street, ensuring that every single level crossing on the Pakenham line will be removed for greater road safety and congestion reduction.

The design for the Beaconsfield level crossing removal will involve constructing a bridge over the rail crossing that will impact upon the Railway House making it unsuitable to continue as a residential home. Therefore the Government will need to acquire the house which led to plans to demolish it.

As a result of your advocacy I met with Minister Allan to inform her of the community's love for the Railway House and its attribute as a local historic asset. In Parliament I called for the protection of this 135 year old property and spoke about its local significance as the Beaconsfield Station Master's House.

Railway House will now be retained as a community asset and we will keep residents informed about any process to determine the future use of the house.

Upper Beaconsfield Recreation Reserve Redevelopment Saved!

In another win for our local community, I can advise that the Cardinia Shire have assured me that they will maintain their original funding commitment made to Upper Beaconsfield Recreation Reserve to completely redevelop the community, sports and Scout facility.

Recently the local user groups had contacted me concerned by a proposed scaling back by Cardinia Shire of their previous commitment for a total rebuild. I visited the complex and agreed with user groups that it was vital that this very worn out facility has a complete redevelopment.

The original proposal was for a new building to be built from a funding partnership between Cardinia Shire and the Andrews Labor Government, which through its Growing Suburbs Fund contributed \$3.35 million.

I wrote to, and met with Cardinia Shire Council Chief Executive Officer Carol Jeffs to advocate for a complete rebuild and am delighted with the outcome that will see a custom built, multi purpose facility provided for the community.

Thanks to the community's advocacy, we have worked together to ensure that the needs of residents have been heard and addressed.

You wrote emails, you completed the feedback, you spread the word.



While this is an amazing result, and we should celebrate it, the Railway House will still be acquired by the Government, the road bridge will still go ahead. The construction of the road bridge will impact the extension at the rear of the house but Government says it is committed to retaining the remainder of the property and key historical elements so our work is not done yet, we will need to continue to ensure that this promise is kept. The owners will still have to leave. This is going to be a huge project in a small area. The wetlands will be impacted as well as much flora and fauna. The traffic statistics are quite low and with many other options around the decision to close the crossing completely would be cheaper and easier. Mr Chaplin read the 'Ode to the Fallen' and led the Last Post and the Rouse and the flags were raised by the 1st Beaconsfield Scouts.

McNaughton Family Story As Read During The ANZAC Memorial Service 2023. Researched and Written by Penny Harris Jennings.

The McNaughton family came to live in Beaconsfield prior to WW1.

Archibald and Mary together with the majority of their adult children settled into life here in Beaconsfield becoming valued members of the community.

When WW1 was declared, William Charles McNaughton was the first and youngest son to enlist for military service on 27 January 1915, his features were described as brown eyes and hair with a fresh complexion. He initially joined the 22 Infantry Battalion as a driver and after training at Broadmeadows proceeded to Egypt on 10 May 1915.

William was mostly called Mick by his family and friends. Prior to his departure he was given a Valedictory Social Farewell at the original Beaconsfield Hall and presented with a wristlet watch, silver cigarette case and wallet.

Later that year Mick returned briefly to Australia as a guard on one of the ships carrying sick and wounded men. When he departed, his older brother Hugh joined him on the journey to fight in France.

Hughie had enlisted with the AIF on 14 July 1915 and had been in training until his departure. **Together Mick** and Hughie travelled the lengthy sea voyage from Australia to Europe. The next two years were long and harsh as



the war dragged on. On 14
October 1917 Hughie was
severely injured, a gunshot
wound to his head and shrapnel
in his lower left arm. He was
treated at Queen Marys Military
Hospital, Whalley, Lancashire,
England before returning home to
Australia aboard the hospital ship
"Euripedes", which arrived in
Melbourne on 21 March 1918.

While Hughie was convalescing with his family, he was given a welcome home party and presented with an inscribed gold medal from the residents of Beaconsfield.

Unfortunately, Hughie's health deteriorated and he was admitted to the Caulfield Military Hospital to undergo an operation to relieve the suffering from his head injury. Sadly, the procedure was unsuccessful and Hughie died on 15 May.

In late 1917 Mick had suffered a bout of scabies and was unwell for several months, he eventually returned to military duty and when the war ended he returned home to Australia being discharged on 25 July 1919.



In March of 1920 Beaconsfield **Fallen Soldiers** Memorial was unveiled in the presence of 200 residents of the town and district. Hughie McNaughton is included on the memorial, we can only imagine how the McNaughton family felt as they (Continued on page 25)

Beaconsfield Rainfall



In November of 1920 Mick married Elizabeth Fanny Yeoman and they lived in Beaconsfield until Mick's employment as a road worker meant moving to Port Welshpool. They had four children.

Such was his enduring love and memory for his brother, Mick named his first-born son, Hugh.

Mick worked hard to support his young family. In September 1944 he contracted pneumonia and died at the relatively young age of 53 years.

The bond of brotherhood is a powerful connection, a lifetime bond.

A brother is a friend given by nature.

Hughie and Mick shared an extraordinary bond as brothers, a powerful connection that never waned.

Together they are remembered, Lest We Forget.
