Helmeted Honeyeater

(Lichenostomus melanops cassidix)

The helmeted honeyeater is the largest and most brightly coloured of the yellow-tufted honeyeater subspecies. It has a distinctive black mask between the yellow throat, pointed yellow ear-tufts and the fixed "helmet" of golden plush like feathers on the forehead, with a dull golden crown and nape demarcated from the dark olive-brown back and wings.

There is currently a trial reintroduction of the Helmeted Honeyeater to Cardinia Creek in the Guy's Hill/ Upper Beaconsfield area. Read the article by Alex Smart on page 23.

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President's Report



Welcome to this Spring edition of the Beaconsfield Banner. The Banner is available on our BPA website www.beaconsfield.org.au

and printed copies are available from a number of local businesses including the Beaconsfield Post Office.

The most significant local issue we are dealing with is the Level Crossing Removal Project (LXRP) and, in particular, the Level Crossing at Station Street, Beaconsfield. This project identified the potential losses of the heritage Bunya Bunya tree as well as the heritage Railway House built circa 1888 located at 20 Beaconsfield Avenue. After community representations, the LXRP revised plans whereby the heritage significant parts of the Railway House and the Bunya Bunya Tree will be saved. The LXRP have maintained their preferred option for a route diagonally south from Goff Street, Beaconsfield Avenue and Station Street intersection through the Old Railway House property (to be compulsorily acquired) with an overpass bridge across the railway line and Kenilworth Avenue and then joining a new roundabout at Kenilworth Avenue. Recently I looked at the worksite for LXRP Station Street, Beaconsfield Project. I was amazed at the size of the building site with all the equipment, portable rooms for the workers, fencing, the noise affecting neighbours and the loss of most of the railway station's carpark. It will certainly radically change Beaconsfield and be disruptive with construction taking two or more years. We need the community to continue advocacy on this project to obtain a favourable outcome for the area.

Since the Melbourne Water letterbox drop in April/ May there is nothing further to report on the Beaconsfield Dam Safety Upgrade Project. Melbourne Water have maintained their position that the Partial Upgrade Option remains their preference and are proceeding with the project with the water level reduced over a three year period.

This Partial Upgrade Option was supported by our Association in all our submissions including to Melbourne Water. It is noted that this announcement only deals with the dam safety. Public access issues will be addressed by the Department of Energy, Environment and Climate Action.

I attended Jim Parkes Reserve for a forum held by Cardinia Shire Council staff to discuss the Redevelopment Masterplans and provide feedback for Stage 1. The redevelopment plan has play areas for juniors and seniors, picnic area with shelter, exercise area, bocce court, seating, shade sails, dry creek bed, deciduous urban forest and Australian native planting.

Recently I have attended annual awards nights for both Beaconsfield Fire Brigade and Beaconsfield Upper Fire Brigade. The work done by our local CFA's is much appreciated by the community and the commitment by volunteers over many years is amazing.

On a personal note, it was sad to hear of the passing of David Brewster. As a child he lived in the Holm Park property before living in a Holm Park Road property for many years. He lived in Tasmania for the past 20+ years. David was well known and active in the Beaconsfield area and was a life member of the Beaconsfield CFA.



Our meeting on Tuesday, 17 October will be our Annual General Meeting as well as a public General Meeting. We are hoping to have a guest speaker. All positions of BPA will be declared vacant and elections held for the positions for the next twelve months. If you are community minded and would like to attend our meetings or be an office bearer we would love to see you or hear from you. Our meetings are held at the Beaconsfield Community Complex on the third Tuesday of each month from 7.30 pm to 9 pm.

Guided walk along Cardinia Creek



Cardinia Shire Council staff are leading a guided walk along Cardinia Creek to celebrate the 'Citizen Science Biodiversity Blitz', taking place during the month of September.

'Citizen science' involves collecting records of nature observed in the environment with your smart phone or other device. You then share your observations with others through phone apps such as 'iNaturalist'. These community records can help scientists understand the health of our natural biodiversity.

Participants on the walk will get to admire the tall Manna Gum Eucalypts in the Cardinia Creek woodland. You'll see animal tree hollows where possums and birds live and look at and smell the flowering Acacias. You'll also get to taste some bush foods and learn about the micro bats that fly through the area at night.

Rainwater harvesting at community complex

Beaconsfield Community Complex has been given a super sustainability upgrade. The centre's new rainwater harvesting system means rainwater can now be used for irrigation and toilet flushing. This will save water and save money.

Fully funded by Cardinia Shire Council, it's one of three sustainability upgrades for shire community facilities - Bunyip Hall and Koo Wee Rup Community Centre have also received enviro upgrades.

It's great to see more sustainable initiatives happening across the shire. Council's goal is to achieve net zero council emissions by 2024, and each sustainable upgrade we make is helping us get closer to that target.

Village Green playground to be renewed

As part of Council's annual playground renewal program, Village Green play space will be renewed in 2023-24, using the footprint of the existing playground. Village Green is in the Panorama estate on Stirling Circuit in Beaconsfield.

During a community consultation in August, Council asked for your feedback on how you use this playground and what you'd like to see as part of the renewal. Thanks to everyone who had their say.

Draft masterplan for Jim Parkes Reserve

Located between Beaconsfield's two major commercial precincts, Jim Parkes Reserve has been identified for an upgrade in 2023-24. The reserve currently has children's play equipment and a picnic shelter.

Cardinia Shire Council has developed a draft masterplan for the reserve, informed by the Beaconsfield Structure Plan and community input.

Brunt Road Level Crossing Removal Project:



The final design released in July 2023 with construction commenced including earthworks foundations, road bridge retaining walls, and underground service

relocation works.

Council has commenced construction of Pioneer Way and Brunt Road intersection upgrade including a new roundabout and the full extension of Pioneer Way.

Connection for all traffic onto the new road bridge over the railway is due for 2024, with full construction and landscaping due to be completed 2025.

Station St Beaconsfield Level Crossing Removal Project:

The community consultation feedback was released by the LXRP project team to Council on 6th July, noting the main themes valued about the local area were - village like atmosphere, heritage, local flora and fauna and sense of community.

The project has closed 360 car spaces at the train station, with 75 remaining and 11 accessible carparks. Council compliance officers are spending time in the local streets to enforce local parking and encouraging parking at Berwick and other stations.

New temporary school crossings are being created in September along Beaconsfield Ave to ensure safety of school children and all pedestrians.

The project has commenced construction of the temporary site office at Beaconsfield Station with major construction works commencing late in 2023.

Council encourages residents and community members to sign up to the Level Crossing Removal Project's SMS service which provides updates on disruptions and closures. Text **STATION** to **0418 998 433** for SMS alerts about future construction impacts in Beaconsfield.

We need to be putting our household waste to better use and avoiding landfill, so finding an alternative is so important!



Melbourne's south east urgently needs an alternative to landfill,

as it is filling up fast and there are no plans for more to be built. Any household waste we can't recycle or recover ends up in landfill – there is currently no other solution for residual household waste. Alongside recycling, and separating food and green waste for composting, advanced waste processing is a smarter solution for the residual household waste than burying it in the ground.

Council has formed a company with other councils to deliver an advanced waste processing alternative to landfill. Together we'll deliver a vital alternative that will transform how household waste is managed!

Tender proposals from 3 industry candidates to explore new technologies, such as waste being transformed into electricity to power homes and businesses, are currently being evaluated.

Don't miss the next FREE green waste drop-off events

Residents are encouraged to prepare for the 2023-24 fire season with Council's free green waste dropoff events this September and October.

Council's green waste drop-off events are a free service accepting residential amounts of green waste including garden prunings, tree branches and trunks (up to 30 centimetres wide and 1 metre long), weeds, grass clippings, leaves, and flowers.

Residents must present photo ID as proof of residence within Cardinia Shire to access the free service.

Waste will only be accepted from residential vehicles and trailers; commercial business operators cannot use this service.

As always there's lots going on for the area at a state level. Please reach out if I can assist you on any State Government matter.

Level crossing update

Works have commenced on the construction of a bridge over the level crossing at

Station St., Beaconsfield. This project is part of the

Government's commitment to remove every level crossing on the Pakenham line by the end of the decade.

As readers will no doubt be aware, following a passionate



campaign by locals, the Government has listened and has committed to protecting the Railway House and Bunya Bunya tree.

Thank you to everyone who has engaged with the consultation process on this project and shared your views. I'm also grateful to those who have directly advocated to me.

Another concern that has been raised in relation to the level crossing removal is ensuring Goff St. doesn't become a busy thoroughfare following the works. I have taken this up with the project team, and they are working on ideas to avoid this becoming an issue.

To enable the crossing removal, a large part of the station car park is temporarily occupied as a works site until 2025. There will be no net loss of parking spaces once the project is complete. In the meantime, those wanting to drive to the train may wish to consider the new multi-level car park recently opened at Berwick station.

As works ramp up, I will monitor the project closely to ensure the agreed protections for our valuable

heritage are closely complied with and that disruption is minimised as much as possible.

A new local primary school

Many new public schools are being built across the state, and one of them is on our doorstep.

Construction works at Officer Brunt Road Primary School (former interim name) are well advanced, and I recently had the chance to visit the worksite along with Pakenham MP Emma Vulin and the Parliamentary Secretary for Schools, Vicki Ward.

Along with newly-appointed principal Sharon Mitchell, we were thrilled to name the school Kurmile Primary School. Kurmile is pronounced kurmill-y and means white cockatoo in the Bunurong language.

The school is already accepting enrolments and will open its doors at the start of Term 1 next year.

State Budget 2023 - New Women's Health **Clinic at Casey**

The State Budget was handed down in late May, and I'm pleased to report on several projects that will benefit this area.

One such initiative is for a new Women's Health clinic to be built at Casey Hospital, one of 20 clinics being delivered as part of a \$221 million investment in Women's health across the state.

The clinics will provide specialist treatment for issues ranging from contraception to endometriosis treatment and menopausal symptoms.

This builds on the Government's commitment to deliver a much-needed expansion of Casey Hospital's emergency department.

Together, these projects will help to ensure Casey Hospital continues to grow in order to keep up with the demands of our fast-growing region.

State Budget 2023 - Mental Health Locals

Funding has also been confirmed to provide a new Mental Health Local facility in Narre Warren.

In addition to this, funds have also been allocated for a future facility in Officer.

These facilities provide frontline mental health support for people aged 26 and over who aren't eligible to access the youth-focused Headspace service.

It will be staffed by mental health professionals and free to access without needing a GP's referral.

Upper Beaconsfield Recreation Reserve

I'm delighted to report that the project to build a new pavilion facility at the Upper Beaconsfield Rec Reserve are back on track. The project (which is part -funded through a \$3.35 million grant from the State Government's Growing Suburbs Fund) was under risk when Council proposed downgrading the project to an upgrade of the existing building.

This would have been an unsuitable outcome for the community, and I reported on our campaign for a full rebuild in the previous issue of the Banner. I'm pleased that we have now regained a commitment for a full rebuild of the facilities by Council. I'd like to thank the reserve committee, Cr Brett Owen and

Mayor Cr Tammy Radford for their efforts in saving this project.

LXRP Station St Beaconsfield Update

When thinking about what, and how, to write this latest article about LXRP Station St Beaconsfield, I was not sure whether to say that we accept that this Project is all about progress and how we have to learn to live with it and embrace it, or, how this Project is still a hugely unnecessary and costly construction here in Beaconsfield. Am I biased because I live across the road from it and it has greatly impacted my life, and that of my neighbours? Should I just be grateful that we have saved the Railway House and bunya tree from demolition?

LXRPs around Melbourne are generally welcomed as they ease congestion, improve safety and often provide brand new stations for commuters. The inconvenience for residents and motorists is accepted for the eventual outcome. Sky Rail, road bridges and trenches are amazing engineering feats and there should be celebrations and congratulations all round when completed. However, here in Beaconsfield does the amount of traffic crossing justify the expense and pain given there are other ways around? Support and comments over the last year tell me that almost all of you do not think so.

So, for those of you who have no need to venture into the Station St./ Beaconsfield Ave part of Beaconsfield, this update is for you.

For those of you who helped us campaign to save the Railway House and bunya bunya tree, wherever you may live, this is for you.

For those of you who, like me, live at Ground Zero of LXRP, you already know what we are enduring every day, all day.

The project to remove the little used level crossing at Station St., Beaconsfield (as opposed to Station St., Officer, that will close) has been underway for four weeks now. Yes, we saved the Railway House and bunya bunya tree but I hope we can still say that in two years.

We had hoped the project would be shelved and the crossing closed, there are a myriad of ways to cross the railway line and we are much better served here than if you lived between Hallam Rd. and Webb St., Narre Warren, for example, or Cardinia Rd and McGregor Rd where there are kilometres between crossings. However, the Labor Government decided, in its infinite wisdom of all things transport and apparently very deep pockets of our money, that spending millions on a huge road bridge was a great and expensive idea! We thought not, and had great support, but sadly contracts were signed and work has begun.

So? What does it look like now? You have probably walked, or driven past this quiet area. The Railway House stood proudly with its red post box out the front.

Here we are recently celebrating with a picnic when our efforts to save Railway House were successful.



The view is vastly different today.



Now there is noisy activity all day long, with heavy vehicles, cranes and trucks constantly busy on this previously quiet thoroughfare, and they are only setting up ready to begin! The crew who will work here will obviously be huge judging by the number of offices, tea rooms, meeting rooms and whatever else will be housed in the double storey complex. I have already counted fourteen air conditioning units, and that is only from one side.





Vegetation has been ripped out and a small temporary fence put up just a few metres around the bunya tree. The impact on the natural environment will cause disruption of habitat for many native flora and fauna and this will ramp up as work progresses down towards the Cardinia Creek. I wonder about the fate of the little

echidna that has been seen around the Railway House and the platypus that call the Cardinia Creek home as much effort has gone into ensuring these little creatures are safe and thriving. A group of kangaroos was also seen in the vicinity recently.

The reduction in carparking spaces at the station has seen a major increase in parking in local streets not designed for all day parking. Some of the drivers need to exercise care and thought as some park too close to driveways and thereby make it hard for residents to safely reverse out. Thank you to Council Parking Officers making regular checks to book those motorists who park illegally. It is particularly hard on bin days when bins are out but cannot be accessed. Commuters have been advised to park at Berwick Station but unfortunately commuters from Narre Warren have been advised to do the same while Webb St and Narre Warren Station faces its own LXRP.

Driving down Beaconsfield Ave, especially at school times, has become quite dangerous with cars parked all day, trucks driving in and out and residents attempting to back out of their driveways so please take extra care and drive to the conditions.

Happy to report the Level Crossing Project Team has swung into action, door knocking affected residents,

mostly during the day, and their pleasant, helpful attitude is an effort to appease those of us about to be damaged by this process, let's face it - they have had plenty of practise over the last few years of the Big Build.

A smoking ceremony was held to signal the start of the Project here and seems somewhat ironic given that what was once a quiet patch of greenery and refuge for nature is fast becoming a concrete jungle of danger

and risk.

When we see the expense that is this construction it is disappointing to read daily in the papers the various important ways this money could be put to better use e.g. Road maintenance/maintaining disability teachers in schools/reducing waiting lists for surgery/getting ambulances back on the roads attending to cases rather than ramping and many other more vital services to support.

However, it seems that the boat has sailed for stopping this project from going ahead. It is now up to all of us to keep an eye out when we see issues we are concerned about and raise it with the team at <u>contact@levelcrossings.vic.gov.au</u>.

They do respond to your concerns and like to engage with, and provide support to the community. They welcome ideas you may have regarding recycling of felled trees and repurposing items, working with local schools and sport and participating in working bees etc. Contact the team if you have ideas. If you live nearby and miss them when they call you may like to register with them for more personal communication, alternatively, if you do not want to hear from them, they will respect that too.

As we brace ourselves for what is ahead, I think back to my introduction. I hope the time to completion passes quickly and smoothly. I really hope that the Railway House and bunya tree can survive as well. Our community at the coal face here in the surrounding area will really need to support each other and stick together in the years to come.

We wish Linda and her family, the previous owners who are still currently looking for a suitable home as lovely as the one they are leaving, all the best as they move forward with their lives.





Beaconsfield History - Dr. Leila Keating

William Andrew Joseph Keating and his wife Ellen owned the cottage known as "Fairwood Park', Beaconsfield, having inherited the property from William's father Andrew Keating in March 1899.



Unfortunately, only sixteen months later William died of pneumonia, leaving his wife Ellen and their four-month old daughter Leila. Ellen's parents and brother came from Walhalla to support her and help operate the farm.



In 1907 Leila is attending the Officer State School, there are only 21 children in a one room school house and the teacher is Miss Dulfer. Students at the school included the Rix sisters Mable and Violet.

Leila was an avid writer and on one occasion wrote "I have no brothers or sisters, and sometimes I feel a bit lonely".

Upon completion at Officer State School Leila then goes on to study at Melbourne

University, graduating in 1915 with an arts degree. Her subjects passed were English language and literature, French language and literature, British history, geography and algebra.

Leila and her mother Ellen, then move to Sydney where Leila studies medicine and completes her final degree examination in 1925. After graduating, she was appointed resident medical officer at the Lithgow Hospital, Sydney.

Dr Leila Keating went on to be a remarkable woman, she was the first woman to sign on the cargo ship "Port Lincoln" as the ship's doctor. After winning an international scholarship she arrived in London in August 1927, to study and live at Crosby Hall, Cambridge University, Chelsea. Crosby Hall was a newly dedicated historical building refurbished as the headquarters of the International Federation of University Women, female graduates from all over the world attended, the first evening at the welcome dinner 27 nations were represented.

After graduating in London, Leila returned to Sydney to take charge of the radio-therapy at St Vincent's Hospital.

Leila was one of the most prominent radiotherapists in Sydney, she also took part in the study of Hodgkin's disease for the Cancer Research Committee.

Leila was a strong advocate for women's role in the workplace.

In 1935 she spoke as the newly elected president of the Australian Open-Door Council at a luncheon of the Victorian Women's Movement. She advocated for equal rates of pay and women having public positions of equal status to men.

In 1936 Leila was at the peak of her career, a leading radiologist in charge of the radio therapy department at St Vincent's Hospital, Sydney. Tragically at the young age of 36 Leila died after a routine appendicitis operation. Her obituary was published in newspapers in both Australia and England commending her for her outstanding contribution to medicine and women's rights.

Sadly Leila is buried alone at the Rookwood Cemetery, Sydney.

HELMETED HONEYEATER: Bird Emblem for Victoria

were selected for further habitat assessment. Eventually Environment Consultants identified the

specimen collected at Bass River, Westernport, more than 150 years ago.

In 2014 we approached Bob Anderson OAM, long term President of the Friends of the Helmeted Honeyeater (He Ho's), based at Yellingbo, with a request to speak to our group at Wilson Botanic Park. Bob understood that, since settlement, He Ho's had lived on the Cardinia Creek until the last confirmed sighting just prior to the devastating Ash Wednesday fires.

The Yellingbo reserve is home to the only established wild population and it was vital that other populations become established. Bob suggested we should endeavour to have a trial reintroduction along the Cardinia



Cardinia Creek, upstream from Guys Hill, as the preferred site for a trial release. Years passed and a few months ago representatives from Zoo's Victoria (who run the captive breeding program at Healesville sanctuary) announced plans for a trial release of 50 He Ho's at Guys Hill in 2024 and 2025, subject to the success of numbers bred.

The latest news is that Zoo's Vic are fencing off areas of Crown land so that feral deer can be excluded from areas where natural regeneration of vegetation should occur; they will then install aviaries to help captive birds transition into a new environment. Zoo's Vic will

conduct the releases and monitor the birds as, hopefully, they settle and breed where their ancestors lived.

2015 our APS group organised a public meeting at the Beaconsfield Community Centre. More than 100 people attended. 

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


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
