

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

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President's Report



Welcome to this Spring edition of the Beaconsfield Banner. The Banner is available on our BPA website www. beaconsfield.org.au and printed copies are available in the town at businesses including the Beaconsfield Post Office and Beaconsfield Pharmacy.

A significant local issue we are dealing with is the Level Crossing Removal Project (LXRP) and, in particular, the Level Crossing at Station Street, Beaconsfield. Work on the Project continues at a fast rate and, at times, works are happening 24/7. In particular, works have continued on the Road Bridge Overpass which is overwhelming in size and will significantly change the landscape. In July, there was a high amount of rainfall causing flooding of Cardinia Creek and the retarding basin other than in the vicinity of areas where the overpass is which have been built up. The machinery to drive pylons into the ground were very noisy and repetitious which must be annoying for the local residents. A meeting was held online recently with the LXRP Authority updating the works being done. A meeting with Michael Galea MP was held for local residents to discuss concerns with the LXRP Authority Works.

Beaconsfield Reservoir and Beaconsfield Nature Conservation Reserve (BNCR)

Earlier this year, it was pleasing to note that Melbourne Water have commenced a slow drawdown of the Reservoir. The drawdown will be over 3 years reducing the water level by 4.85M AHD. There will be extended areas of wetlands to enhance the ecology. This accords to the Melbourne Water Partial Upgrade Plan which is preferred by BPA, Inc. We look forward to future works including amenities in the BNCR so that the Reservoir and BNCR are a safe park which the public can access and enjoy in the future.

There is a lot of activity near Beaconsfield-Emerald Road in the Berwick Views Estate to replace the three Boardwalks. The Boardwalk closest to the carpark entrance has now been replaced with an attractive timber bridge. The second boardwalk

alongside Fieldstone Blvd. and Lakeside Terrace has now been replaced with retaining walls and new gravel paths. The third boardwalk on Beaconsfield-Emerald Road has now been replaced with a steel platform and is awaiting the new decking.

Revitalisation of Jim Parkes Reserve – Souter Street, Beaconsfield

Council has turned the first sod to mark the revitalisation of the Jim Parkes Reserve in Beaconsfield.

Featuring a new playground, open space, gathering areas, landscaping and a new shelter, the site upgrade has been informed by local community consultation.

The Jim Parkes Reserve revitalisation is supported and funded by Council and the Victorian Government's Growing Suburbs Fund.

Beaconsfield "Coronel Wetlands" Boardwalk Renewals

To improve community safety and access, the existing timber boardwalk is being replaced with different materials including new timber, retaining walls and granitic sand footpaths.

The wooden bridge at the southern end of the wetlands (near the shops) and the improved paths near the section of the wetlands at Fieldstone and Scenic Boulevard are now complete.

The works for the replacement of the extensive boardwalk along the Beaconsfield-Emerald Road to the north of Fieldstone Boulevard continues. The board walk screw poles, steel structure and concrete abutments are complete.

Unfortunately, there has been a delay in the delivery of decking material. It was originally intended to be installed in August, but due to supply issues it is envisaged that this will be installed in September. Some footpath realignment will also occur after the deck is installed.



These works are being completed as part of Council's Bridge Renewal program.

The brigade continues to be busy with fire calls sometimes three a day combined with weekly training on a Tuesday night and further training and maintenance of the three trucks and supporting

vehicle on Sundays.

The hoses need to be tested regularly for stress tears, leaks, and normal wear. This task is expertly carried out by a long time member Brian Unwin who has served this brigade for nearly 60 years and who with James Cain ensure our hoses are fit for purpose and do not fail in the critical times.

The brigade has three vehicles. Two supplied by the CFA and one brigade owned. This vehicle started its life as a Holden one ton ute with a tank on the rear. Its primary purpose in 1982 was to have some fire

protection when the CFA tanker was seconded to other parts of the state.

As the town grew so did the fire fighting requirements. The Holden was replaced with an Izuzu truck and large tank. Funds for this truck was raised by members with raffles, street stalls, and businesses in Beaconsfield.

Today replacement cost is in excess of 300k and plans are in place to explore what options are available and how to pay for a new tanker in the future. Meantime the current truck is still fit for purpose and well maintained.

Please remember to check your smoke alarms are operational and that you have an exit plan in case of fire.

Kinder Olympics

All of our kinder groups followed the Olympics, looking at different events, nations and flags and even keeping a medal tally (go Aussies!). The Olympics also provided fantastic opportunities to look at resilience, diversity, inclusion and healthy lifestyles.



Each kinder child participated in an Olympic themed experience and received their very own Beaconsfield Kindergarten medal to take home.

Incursions

Our 4 year old kindergarten groups have participated in protective behaviours sessions with KidsROAR during August. Protective Behaviours has two core themes that are emphasised throughout the KidsROAR Programs:

Theme 1: We all have the right to feel safe at all

Theme 2: We can talk about anything with someone we trust, no matter what it is.

During the sessions, children were given the foundation for understanding:

- feelings
- early warning signs

- safe and unsafe behaviours
- the difference between public and private
- their private body parts
- the difference between safe and unsafe secrets
- how to implement the NO, GO, TELL strategy
- who their trusted adults are.

Many of our kinder groups have been learning about emergency services, which helps to support their learning about what they can do in the event of an emergency. Children as young as four have been able to call triple zero and provide essential information to emergency services. Some of our groups have been very excited to have visits from the SES and paramedics.

Community Connections

Partnering with other services in our community is an important way of fostering relationships and building our community. Our 4 year old kinder groups have recently participated in walking excursions to Beaconsfield Primary School, where they visited a Prep classroom, did a tour of the school and were introduced to what a school setting might look like.

Central Hotel Timeline (Bowmans Inn and Gippsland

Hotel) By Penny Harris Jennings

The Central Hotel has been a constant in Beaconsfield for almost 100 years, the site has been a hotel for 170 years, formerly the Bowmans Inn and Gippsland Hotel. A timeline of owners and licensees, 1853-1987 is as follows:

1853: Panty Gurn Gurn Run Land transferred to David Bowman by William Bowman (no relation).

1855: David took up his pre-emptive Right to 200 acres of the run, cost 200 pounds, The Hotel licence for the Hotel is dated 17 April 1855.

1856: Census, David Bowman Gipps Land Hotel, Innkeeper, leasehold, on Cardinia Creek.

1856: Meeting place for the Mornington Farmers Society.

"The annals of the Mornington Farmers' Society is as yet (February, 1858) both short and simple. A meeting was held at Mr. Bowman's Inn, on the Cardinia Creek, for the purpose of forming a district road board, about two years ago. It was at that meeting I first proposed my scheme for establishing a farmers' society in this district under the auspices of the Port Phillip Farmers' Society, and before the meeting dispersed about twenty, or nearly all the gentlemen present, had enrolled their names as members of the proposed society. At the next meeting of committee

Leader, 24 November 1906.

1860: David Bowman died 6 August 1860, Hotel valued at 2000 pounds.

1861-1868: The Hotel was operated by Janet Bowman


1862: Berwick Road District Board, son Alexander Bowman foundation member, resigned 1867.

1868: 10 July, transfer to Helen Sarah Ann Gibbs 1500 pounds.

1869: Prince Alfred, the Duke of Edinburgh stayed at the Hotel; 2 extra rooms were built and paid for by the government.

1869: 24 November, transfer to Charles Souter 1200 pounds.


1879: A Norman, Licensee.



South Bourke and Mornington Journal, 10 December 1879

1880: Gippsland Hotel for sale, passed in at 1800 pounds.

1880: Clearing Sale Auctions conducted at Hotel for local farms.



1881: Edward Henry Key, Licensee.

1882-1915: Racecourse meetings and functions.

1882-1884: Mary Ann Key (Souter) Gippsland Hotel, Licensee.


1885-1891: Mrs George Gissing Licensee, refurbished.

1886: Pigeon racing meetings.

1887: Magisterial Inquiry into the death of George Brown Jnr, body stored there until the funeral (Inveresk, Berwick) (Cricket played on adjoining racecourse).

1890: 28 August. George Gissing died.

1893-1900: John Vail Cougle, Licensee, died suddenly 8 January 1901 age 77.

1904: 21 January. Janet Bowman died.

1907-1911: Mrs Catherine White, Owner and Licensee, charged with trafficking in liquor during prohibitive hours.

1912: Frederick Umhauer, Licensee Gippsland Hotel.

1913: Transfer of Licensee, 3 September Mr Frederick Umbauer to Arthur Robert Bragg.



The Gippsland Hotel c. 1914 advertised with a Billiard room, Good Stabling and motor vehicles were offered for hire.

1914: Gippsland Hotel with 43 acres sold by Mrs Catherine White to Mrs Emily Bragg, 2 July, 3000 pounds, Emily had intentions to modify. The Hotel was advertised with a Billiard room, Good Stabling and Motor vehicles were offered for hire.

1914: 24 December, Gippsland Hotel now named the Central Hotel.

1915: 19 August Mrs Emily Bragg was granted License of the Central Hotel as Mr Arthur Robert Bragg had joined WW1.

1915: Albert Birchinall Steele, publican died 14 July.

1915: 11 November Mrs Albert Birchinall (Sarah) Steele has obtained lease of Bragg's Central Hotel.

1916: 7 December. Sarah Steele, Licensee.

1916-1917: Beaconsfield Sports Club Meetings.

1919: Transfer of Licensee, Clarrie Alberta May Steele (executrix of the late Sarah Steele, who died 16 January), to Edith Grace Rainford.

1919: "Mr John Alfred Peake, of the Druids Hotel, South Melbourne, has purchased the Central Hotel, Beaconsfield, from Mrs Emily Bragg, and intends to renovate the premises. The transaction also includes the racecourse paddock".

In October Jane Prentice became Licensee.

1920: 2 December, Mrs Alice Cecelia Minogue purchased Central Hotel (clearing Sale cancelled).

1922: Charles Stewart Turnley, from Sydney "commenced Hotel keeping at the Central Hotel, Beaconsfield, of which a lease was purchased for the modest sum of 600 pounds" (The Licensing records do not reflect that Turnley did operate the hotel).

South Bourke and Mornington Journal 25 November 1920.

Charles Stewart Turnley, now in the early forties, came from Sydney in 1922 and commenced hotel-keeping at the Central Hotel, Beaconsfield, of which a lease was purchased for the modest sum of £600.

The Herald, 14 July 1936

1922: 21 February, license transfer, Jane Prentice to Eric Albert Stone.

In July, John Culpin becomes Licensee.

1923: In May, Lucy Dickinson becomes the Licensee.

1925: In March, Norman Parslow becomes Licensee.

1926: In October, Sidney Stella Smith becomes Licensee, one room is described as the Music Room.

1927-1931: 16 July 1927, William and Joanna Ethel Gough, Licensee (Phone No 1).

From Licensing Board, stating that the rebuilding of Central Hotel, Beaconsfield, was to commence by 1st February next.—Received.

(opened by 5 April 1928, auction advertised) *The Dandenong Journal 22 September 1927*

1935: 19 March, Gough transfers License to Vernon Webb of St Kilda.

1937: 14 September transfer of License from Vernon Webb to Henry Joseph Sharp.

1938: 2 February, transfer of License from Henry Joseph Sharp to Harry Ellis and John Thomas Nicholls

1937-1968: During this time the Hotel had wedding receptions and breakfasts.

1941: 21 October, transfer of License from Harry Ellis and John Thomas Nicholls to Linda Blanche Budge.

1941-1968: George Thomas David Howison Budge and Linda Blanche (Lawrence) Budge owners.

1944: 20 January Central Hotel saved from Bushfire.

In November Licensee is Annie Elizabeth Heathcote.

1947-1949: 3 November Licence transferred from Linda Blanche Budge to Walter Martin and Myrtle Irene Coloe.

1951: In November, Licensee is William McTaggart Traill Campbell.

1953: The License is transferred to George Edgar Budge and Wallace Charles Budge.

BEACONSFIELD PUBLICAN GIVES NEW SITE FOR HALL

IN VIEW of the fact that the Beaconsfield Hall now stands on C.R.B. property, Mr. G. Budge, of the Central Hotel, has offered to give a block of land at the corner of Liste Av. and Prince's

Highway for the re-erection of the hall; also a gift of £100 towards the cost of removal.

Mr. Budge is to be highly commended for his generous offer and public spiritedness.

1987: The Hotel sold for \$1.64 million and in December B & G Pollard, Richard Graham Pollard is operating as Licensee.

Beaconsfield Reservoir - A Much Needed Public Park for Future Growth by Harry Jensen and Andre Bokos

Those who lived locally before the firestorm which engulfed Upper Beaconsfield (UB), Beaconsfield, Officer, etc in February 1983, will recall the aftermath – the loss of life, homes, property, animals and local infrastructure, etc. Loss of life did not touch everyone's family or home, but much was destroyed leaving behind a smouldering blackened landscape to

moved out of the area to safer locations. New arrivals to UB will not have experienced the wrath and aftermath of a firestorm such as Ash Wednesday and by God's grace, we hope they never do. However, the chances of a reoccurrence of such an event, are considered greater than ever, because we are simply not prepared for it as we should be.

all points of the compass. Livestock, haysheds, fences, pasture all gone. No birds or wildlife. It took many days to bury the dead and swollen livestock. Very stark and sombre viewing on rural properties, with some families having to face even greater tragedies. Such an event is etched into your soul never to be removed. In many cases it took over a decade for things to get back to anywhere near normal.

Over the past 41 years the bush has returned bigger and more confronting than in 1983. The regrowth and "leaf area" has increased significantly. Horizons that were clearly visible prior to Ash Wednesday are now

blocked from view. Many new residents and their families have moved into local estates. The number of children attending schools is testament to that. After the "experience", original residents

In the areas of South Belgrave and Upper Beaconsfield some 92 square kms were burnt, 21 fatalities and 238 homes destroyed not to mention various local infrastructure like the Pinegrove Hotel, Shops, the Church, etc. In Cockatoo 6 lives and 307 homes were lost. Among the lives lost were a notable number of brave and heroic volunteer CFA and CFS firefighters. We honour them whenever possible similar to the ANZACS. Those that died on Ash Wednesday, locally, but also those who died in SA and elsewhere on that fateful day need to be remembered by preparing the communities here and elsewhere for the next firestorm. There have



been several hot summers since 1983 and we have been stunningly lucky not to have suffered a repeat of Ash Wednesday, although we have had some close moments. The legacy that was

left by those who died was that we the survivors should do whatever it takes to defend, protect and survive.

Were you aware that the water supply in Upper Beaconsfield failed on Ash Wednesday, because the power supply was cut by the fire or the electricity supplier? At the most crucial moment there was no water. The loss of power could happen again in the next firestorm. Since then, Melbourne Water (MW) has upgraded the pumping arrangements to the

water tower in UB and we hope that town water supply will be maintained during an event. But we need more to protect us.

This area has been described as one of the worst fire zones in Australia. The speed and ferocity of the flames on Ash Wednesday, aided by abundant fuels due to a lack of necessary fuel reduction by Cool Burning, and a landscape immersed in smoke, made fire suppression and containment impossible (at ground level). Couple that with a failed town water supply. We are told repeatedly that we are not to expect

the CFA to attend our properties. They might, but there is not even a semblance of a guarantee. We each have to take responsibility for how we protect ourselves, our families, our properties. Not a comforting scenario.


But now there is a gamechanger in all of this. CFA Firefighting Helicopters. Victoria has some 60 firebombing aircraft in its firefighting fleet spread around the State. It's an impressive defence force. Forty years ago, not many helicopters were

operating apart from the occasional police helicopter with a loudspeaker urging residents to immediately vacate from their homes. Back then, there were a few helicopters to bomb the fire from above with the ability to deliver thousands of litres of water in one pass. These aircraft can refill from water bodies in a few minutes.

Beaconsfield Reservoir is the nearest water body with a huge capacity closest to our communities of UB, Beaconsfield, Officer, and Pakenham West, but

MW is hell bent on destroying it. Take a moment to think about that. The very public asset that can change how all of our communities cope with a wildfire is being destroyed by a Government Authority that arrogantly has no interest in protecting our communities from a repeat of Ash Wednesday. On March 4, 2024, Melbourne Water informed us that it would start draining the reservoir's water which will continue for another 3 years! When the draining has been completed, MW will begin to bulldoze 8 metres of the wall, leaving very little of the original reservoir which supplied

HMAS Cerberus Naval Base and formed a 100 Km aqueduct line which supplied our region and Mornington Peninsula. MW is moving ahead by dropping the water level in the reservoir from a 525 megalitre capacity down to a mere 90. (Full Supply Level was 912 megalitres). At the Decommissioned Supply Level of 525 megalitres, several helicopters can draw water from the reservoir at the same time.

Microbats by Alex Smart

We were busy preparing to move into a retirement village. During a working bee in June they needed blankets to protect furniture loaded onto a trailer. Wendy went into our shed and chose an old bedspread. When it was unfolded there was a loud call which demanded me to attend.

A pair of Microbats had been comfortable in the bedspread where they were either in torpor or hibernating until warmer days increased the insect population. They had no problem entering the shed as the back roller door was jammed open.

With this excitement, photos were essential after which Wendy carefully carried them and installed them in a fork of a

Blue Berry Ash (Eleocarpus reticulatus). Less than half an hour later they were gone hopefully to a safe spot.

It was a privilege to have the opportunity to

photograph these tiny nocturnal animals. While most Australian animals are marsupials microbats like you and me are mammals. Bats are the only mammals capable of flying.

A little more information may be of interest. In winter there are so few insects about that microbats, in cold climates (e.g. southern Australia),

save energy by hibernating. They usually choose a cold sheltered place and are able to slow their heart rate and drop their body temperature close to that of their surroundings. They have eyes but navigate to catch insects using sonar, the pitch being higher than the range of human hearing. Microbats weigh up to 30 grams which is the weight of a AA battery.

They certainly are abundant in Beaconsfield and on summer nights they can sometimes be seen flying over shrubs or trees feeding on insects.




Fairwell Alex and Wendy



Big news for Casey Hospital! We're soon to be doubling the capacity of the emergency room, by creating an additional 45 points of care. Funded in this year's State Budget, this is a really important upgrade for the hospital as the area's population continues to grow.

You may have seen works already taking place around Jim Parkes Reserve in the centre of

town. The State Government has partnered with Council to jointly fund a major upheaval of this treasured but tired playground and park, with new play equipment, drainage, paths and gardens currently being installed.

I also know that better bus services are an important issue locally. So I'm delighted to report on a recently announced network extension in Casey-Cardinia that will benefit Beaconsfield. The 928, currently wholly within Pakenham, will be extended to Berwick and serve the newest parts of Beaconsfield and Officer, running along Rix Rd and Brunt Rd, areas which are currently without service.

The route will be taking advantage of the recently built road bridge as part of the Brunt Rd level crossing removal project. This is a very timely project that's part of the State Government's broader package of removing all 22 level crossings on the Pakenham line. Thank you to the local community for your patience whilst this crossing was removed.

Residents of the Banner will be familiar with the community's successful campaign to preserve our historic Railway House and Bunya Bunya tree. I was proud to be able to announce last year that the Government had listened and would no longer be demolishing the house and tree as part of this project.

Today I'm happy to report that the modification works will be far less intrusive than had been expected. Not only will the original heritage aspects of the house be retained fully, but the vast majority of the newer house extension will also be preserved, with only one small corner (the sunroom) requiring removal.

This is an excellent result for the community, and I'd again like to thank the passionate locals who have spoken up on this issue.

Now is a great time to make your voice heard over what future you'd like to see for this historic building. Would it make a good community venue, or a social enterprise café? Would you like to see Council manage the site, a private business or a local not-for-profit? I'm keen to hear your thoughts.

As the weather starts to warm up it's time once again to start thinking about fire plans for the summer fire period. The Government has recently upgraded a number of Ultra Light Tankers across Victoria. These light vehicles have been equipped with compressed air foam-based deluge systems which can be deployed in the event of a burn-over, to save the lives of the occupants inside. At the announcement we had our very own Upper Beaconsfield brigade in attendance who demonstrated the new system on one of their vehicles.



Queuing is likely unnecessary, but not so at 90 megalitres.

MW has stated that it prefers CFA helicopters to source water from Cardinia Reservoir, which it points out is only a few minutes away to the north of the UB CBD. But just think about that for a minute. If fire is travelling at 50 Kms per hour, it is essential to draw water from the closest source to save water refilling time and save houses. Minutes are incredibly important, but seconds are even more so. A large part of UB township, the whole area to the south of Salisbury Rd - Leppitt Rd to Beaconsfield township, Pakenham West, Officer and communities are clearly better protected by retaining Beaconsfield Reservoir at the 525 megalitre level. The time lost for an aircraft travelling to Cardinia Reservoir to get water to fight a fire front in O'Neil Rd, Browns Rd, or Dickie Rd, which are the boundary of the Beaconsfield Reservoir, is a complete and utter nonsense.

Another important factor is that Cardinia Reservoir is really water storage for Melbourne's potable drinking water, whereas Beaconsfield Reservoir is not. The pollution caused by an aircraft accident in Cardinia dam spilling surfactant and dye must be taken into account. A pollution incident in the Beaconsfield Reservoir won't

affect Melbourne's drinking water.

In effect, MW is all but removing the very asset that offers a realistic hope of saving lives, properties,

assets and local infrastructure - the schools, shops, hotels, Kinders, Halls, the Community Centres, aged care communities, Fuels stations, Churches, etc. The

demise of the reservoir by MW is based on a barely transparent cost cutting factor. However, MW is claiming its justification is based on safety concerning the reservoir wall. This premise has been challenged by an eminently qualified Large Dam Engineer, Robert Evans (Dip. Civil Engineering 1968, Member Institute Engineers Australia, Past Secretary the Australian National Committee on Large Dams - ANCOLD, Senior **Engineer Hydraulic Structures** - Snowy Mountains Engineering Corporation, Retired). He has joined the "Save the Beaconsfield Reservoir Action Group" Committee. Our 1,650 members are on Facebook. MW's original decommissioned reduction in water level from 912 megalitres to 525 megalitres has all but mitigated the 1 in 1,000,000-year risk of the reservoir wall collapsing. MW's preferred option has more to do with cost and maintenance issues. The Officer and District Community, which is most subject to any risk of wall collapse, has never been formally consulted about the matter which should question MW's unprofessional attitude towards community consultation. MW's claimed risk is insignificant when

compared to the huge risk from another Ash Wednesday bushfire.

MW has a responsibility to protect life and property, but now it is not only destroying our reservoir, it is putting in jeopardy the entire surrounding area. To date, it has shown an unwillingness to do any more than consider what is in its best interest, rather than what is best for the public. To a greater or lesser degree MW is not alone. The position of Cardinia Council, Emma Vulin MP representing Pakenham Electorate, the entire Pakenham CFA Group, the former UB Association, DEECA, and the former managers of BNCR - the Cardinia Environment Coalition, have done little or nothing to protect the Beaconsfield Reservoir from demolition. The State Government has supported MW's decision, so this has become political, but what is political about wanting to better protect local communities from another Ash Wednesday, when another El Nino summer can occur again at some stage. With the increased risk from climate change causing future droughts and bushfires as well as other perspectives at play, it is exceptionally irresponsible that these groups appear content to let MW do what it wants. When so much is at risk to the public, that particular attitude is completely unacceptable.

To avoid a future charge of "culpability", all parties involved must support the retention of the 525 megalitre water level. Those who govern or represent us, have a moral (if not "mandatory") obligation to protect all who live within this fire prone area of Cardinia Shire, especially given the Ash Wednesday experience which brought death and destruction. By preserving the Reservoir water level at 525 megalitres we bolster our defences by enabling fire-fighting aircraft to draw water from it.

Cardinia Council promotes the "Active places", and "Open Spaces Strategy" The Active places project encourages residents to be physically active in their community. A walk guide sets out 10 motivating walks in various parts of the Shire. The Cardinia Shire Open Space Strategy 2023–2033 provides a framework for Cardinia Shire Council to plan, deliver and maintain open space to create a network of enticing, inclusive, well connected, sustainable and equitable open space, that meets the current and future needs of our community. The reservoir presents a unique opportunity (maybe the most unique) for residents to have a new walking trail through the reserve and "around" the reservoir. What could be more desirable? Cardinia Council should be more strongly supporting saving Beaconsfield Reservoir from MW's determined,

unconsulted action.

The photos show the total disregard for saving this significant environmental area which was until this year, a thriving area of biodiversity that supported a healthy wetland and bushland environment. Now this environment, and the safety of local residents, in the event of a bush fire impacting our area, is being put at serious risk and safety. We urge all who are willing to speak in favour of preserving the current Beaconsfield Reservoir wall and water level at 525 megalitres. We need to do so with gusto and conviction to convince those in power, and to demand a reversal of the current course of action by MW. There is no time to lose.

The campaign to save Beaconsfield Reservoir is urgently needed to support public enjoyment in both Cardinia and Casey. Our committee has written to the Environment Minister and DEECA, asking for the appointment of another Manager to BNCR, such as Parks Victoria, to allow public access to this enormous public park of 417 acres with Beaconsfield Reservoir at its centre. The reservoir lake was previously covering 17 acres, and would have allowed fishing, canoeing, swimming, picnicking, Botanical research for school groups, bush walking, and photography. It is also a vital water sanctuary for migratory water birds flying from the coast to inland waters.

Please sign our paper Petition in Upper Beaconsfield at Up the Hill Bakery, the Post Office and the Foodworks Supermarket, or in Beaconsfield at the Post Office, and Middle Ground Café. In Berwick at Physiofit and the Akoonah Park Mens Shed, and in Officer at the Saddlery in Tivendale Rd, and Officer Recreation Reserve Tennis Club and Sports Rooms. 




