



President's Report



Welcome to this Summer edition of the Beaconsfield Banner. The Banner is available on our BPA website www. beaconsfield.org.au and printed copies are available in the town at businesses including the

Beaconsfield Post Office and Beaconsfield Pharmacy.

A significant local issue we are dealing with is the Level Crossing Removal Project (LXRP) and, in particular, the Level Crossing at Station Street. Work on the project continues at a fast rate and, at times, works are happening 24/7. In particular, works have continued on the road bridge overpass which is overwhelming in size and will significantly change the landscape. Works on the roundabout at Goff St/ Beaconsfield Ave continue and are nearly complete. Fortunately the old 'Railway House' has been mostly left intact apart from the section at the rear used as a sunroom. An Arborist inspected the Bunya Bunya pine and reported it was in good condition. Some members and also local residents recently attended the Local Community Reference Group to discuss concerns of local residents with the LXRP works. The meeting was arranged by Michael Galea MP and was also attended by Cr Brett Owen.

Engage Victoria has commenced a survey to name the Beaconsfield road bridge as it is a new road. BPA has been consulted and the nominations are Rushton Road, McKenna Drive, Nott Drive and Parklands Drive. The survey must be lodged by 15 December, 2024 and can be done online at www.engage.vic.gov.au/lxrp-station-streets-beaconsfield-and-officer

For future place names, Cardinia Shire Council encourages locals to nominate individuals who have left a notable legacy within the community to be included in the Victorian Governments' Name a Place Campaign. This campaign spotlights local heroes for commemorating them when place naming new streets, parks, community facilities and buildings.

Melbourne Water have continued a slow drawdown of the Beaconsfield Reservoir. The drawdown will be over 3 years reducing the water level by 4.85M AHD. This will result in extended areas of wetlands to

enhance the ecology. This accords to the Melbourne Water Partial Upgrade Plan which is the supported position of the BPA. We look forward to future works hopefully to include amenities in the BNCR so that the reservoir and BNCR are a safe park which the public can access and enjoy in the future. However, responsibilities of BNCR stakeholders are unclear.

BPA recently received a Cardinia Shire Wellbeing / Support Grant of \$1,000 for our Operation Christmas Trees and Decorations at Beaconsfield. After last year's fabulous Christmas Trees Display, we intend to have Beaconsfield looking great this year with 11 trees at 4 locations. We are also engaging with the local community including Beaconsfield Primary School, Beaconsfield Tennis Club and co-opted members.

Works are nearly finished on the Jim Parkes Reserve upgrade and it is currently available for use. There was extensive consultation with the community to discuss the upgrade of most of the reserve and playground equipment. This reserve has always been popular with children particularly due to being close to Beaconsfield Primary School.

The works on Bonette Reserve are nearly complete and it is looking good now that the seating has been installed.

Carols by the Creek will be held at Bob Burgess Reserve on Sunday, 22 December. Organisers are hoping for fine weather and a good crowd for this family friendly event.

bridge over the level crossing between Kenilworth Avenue and Beaconsfield Avenue. The project is now undertaking community consultation, requesting feedback on the naming of the new road bridge.

The LXRP project team has worked with Geographic Naming Victoria (GNV) and Beaconsfield Progress Association (BPA) to consult and gather eligible proposed names to consider for the Beaconsfield LXRP Road naming consultation, as well as seeking the relevant family, consent an important requirement according to GNV's road naming rules.

LXRP have received endorsed names by GNV and are compliant with the road naming rules as well as receiving relevant family consent as such have gone out to consultation with the community for feedback on Engage Victoria which has all the details.

Inviting nominations for local heroes to be commemorated in future place naming in Cardinia Shire

There are many notable individuals who have left meaningful legacies withing our community, and these are the kinds of individuals who have helped make Cardinia Shire the vibrant place it is today. Through public nominations we can learn about these individuals and honour their contributions in future place naming opportunities.

Nominations made on behalf of Cardinia Shire community members will be collated by Geographic Names Victoria (GNV) and provided to Council to store in a name bank to be considered for future use within the municipality.

Nominations for the Name a Place Campaign are open until 16 December 2024.

- · installation of bump rail along path.

previously consisted of timber boardwalks and concrete pathways, and to ensure community safety and access, it was important that the boardwalk was replaced and updated.

The works on the Rotunda and associated boardwalk abutting Sanctuary Way continue.

Catastrophic - For your survival leave bushfire areas





Carols by the Creek 2024 By Glynn Owen



Beaconsfield Dental wins FDI Sustainability Award

Congratulations to Dr Robert Panjkov on winning the FDI (World Dental Federation) individual sustainability award. Beaconsfield Dental had been at the forefront of environmental sustainability for over ten years.

Beaconsfield Reservoir - Impending Loss of a Valuable and Essential Local Landmark by Harry Jensen

More of the public needs to become aware of the serious bush fire risk and lack of community safety that will ultimately be created by Melbourne Water's decision to drain most of the water from the 106 year old historic Beaconsfield Reservoir. This

reservoir is situated inside Beaconsfield Nature Conservation Reserve and lies between Beaconsfield, Officer and Upper Beaconsfield. With around 120,000 residents currently living in Cardinia Shire, and that number

set to steadily increase over the next few years, it is time that many more residents became concerned at what is happening out of the public's sight, and what safety issues could ultimately impact hundreds of local residents. Melbourne Water's decision to drain the water from the reservoir will pose an existential threat from a major bush fire to the local

environment, native wildlife, and residents, especially the new housing estates being built North of the Princes Highway in Beaconsfield and Officer!

At least 440 Megalitres of precious and irreplaceable

water is being drained from Beaconsfield Reservoir in a controversial and unconsulted decision by Melbourne Water. There was no discussion between Melbourne Water and our communities, merely a lecture with a Power Point Presentation in 2018. That was followed a year later with six small group information sessions that Melbourne Water ran,

which confirmed Melbourne Water's preferred decision upon the local community. Any community based concerns were never discussed and the lectures were still only presented to just the townships of Upper Beaconsfield and Beaconsfield!

Officer, which is the most relevant township that could be affected by this highly improbable flood event from the reservoir, was never approached and never received the lecture, despite being just a small distance down the Princes Hwy

from the other two townships. Officer is by all accounts the most likely area where this "Flood" as claimed by Melbourne Water would cross the highway, following the path of the Gum Scrub Creek. The residents in Upper Beaconsfield and Beaconsfield were never going to be affected by this claimed flood event, because either they live at

a higher elevation than the reservoir, or their properties are on the other side of hills which bar any water flowing from the reservoir.

The impending loss of the water from Beaconsfield Reservoir will have a

detrimental outcome in another wildfire situation, like the 1983 Ash Wednesday Fire which left a disastrous aftermath. That fire, headed along Cardinia Creek towards Beaconsfield, destroying many homes, properties and bushland, and we

I wish everyone a Merry Christmas and Happy New Year, may this time be filled with joy, love and special time spent with family and friends.





urgently need to retain a substantial local water supply to extinguish it using CFA helicopters. Haunting memories of that bush fire are still vividly remembered with a great deal of fear and trepidation by local residents that experienced that wildfire. If Melbourne Water is allowed to drain Beaconsfield Reservoir, then all properties and houses between Salisbury Rd and Princes Hwy in Beaconsfield and Officer will have to rely on CFA helicopters flying many more kilometres further afield to Cardinia Reservoir, filling up with water, and then flying the long distance back to houses below Beaconsfield Reservoir! It is amazing that the State Government hasn't taken the time to consider the enormous consequences of Melbourne Water's decision!

Melbourne Water has downplayed the concern over losing Beaconsfield Reservoir, telling the community that some water will remain in the reservoir and if required, more water will be available at Cardinia Reservoir, However Cardinia Reservoir is Melbourne's South East drinking water, so what happens if a helicopter accidentally plunges into the reservoir with all of its surfactants and fire suppressants that CFA helicopters carry onboard? These chemicals will surely contaminate Cardinia Reservoir's drinking water.

That's a major catastrophe waiting to happen!

Attached are photos of what the Beaconsfield Reservoir used to look like and how it is beginning to look now that Melbourne Water and DEECA have started to drain Beaconsfield Reservoir's water!
