

President's Report



Welcome to this Winter edition of the Beaconsfield Banner. The Banner is available on our BPA website and printed copies are available in the town at businesses.

A significant local issue we are dealing with is the Level Crossing Removal Project (LXRP) at Station Street, Beaconsfield. During March, the Station Street Beaconsfield boom gates from the level crossing were dismantled as part of the level crossing removal. In addition, the new McKenna Drive bridge was opened. The new bridge connects Beaconsfield Avenue to Kenilworth Avenue permanently separating vehicles and trains (cover photo). Crews have begun packing up the work site including taking down site sheds and will move out of the area in the coming months. Landscaping and footpath widening is nearly complete with approximately 80 Australian native and indigenous trees and 75,000 plants and shrubs are to be planted in the project area. The southern station car park with 105 parking spaces has reopened to the public.

A community event was held on Saturday, 28 June in the Beaconsfield Station car park to celebrate the completion of major works for the project. The event included activities for kids, free food and coffee. Steam Rail Victoria provided free rides on a fully restored A2 Class Steam locomotive from Berwick Station to Pakenham East Station.

The future of the Railway House which is owned by the State Government is still undecided. Part of the rear of the House was removed to allow the building of the new bridge. The house and Bunya pine need to be retained for heritage purposes and would be a valuable community asset for Cardinia Shire. It was great to see the red letterbox being handed back to a sentimental Ian Cole a previous owner of the Railway House.

The Beaconsfield ANZAC Memorial Service was held on Sunday 20 April at the War Memorial site at Bonette Reserve. Despite being held during Easter and School holidays there was a good attendance in fine weather to remember service men and women who served in wars and conflicts and, in particular, those from Beaconsfield. There was a march along Woods Street prior to the Memorial Service. The

Memorial Service included the Memorial Address written by Penny Harris Jennings for Lieutenant Edgar Marsden, the reading of the Beaconsfield Soldiers' names and the Ode to the Fallen by Eric Chaplin OAM Upper Beaconsfield RSL, the Last Post, one minute's silence and the Rouse and laying of the Wreaths. Thanks to the many people involved in the service including Mayor Cr Jack Kowarzik, Cr Brett Owen, Beaconsfield Officer Scouts, Beaconsfield CFA including Juniors and Piper Simon Gibson.

The upgraded Bonette Reserve is looking good with new paving, seating, gardens, landscaping, underground power, new flag poles, parking and footpath upgrades. These works have greatly enhanced this Reserve for the use and enjoyment of the community.

Recently, Cardinia Shire Council installed various speed humps along Fieldstone Boulevard in Berwick Views to help the flow of traffic. Hopefully this will improve the safety of this road.

It was a pleasure to attend the Beaconsfield CFA Awards Night. It is always amazing to witness the number of fire brigade members receiving various service awards. On behalf of our community, we greatly appreciate all the work done by CFA volunteers.

APA has been conducting essential maintenance work on the T60 Longford to Dandenong Pipeline in Beaconsfield Park. The works involve excavation ,pipeline repairs and site cleanup. The works are due to be completed soon.

Ann and I were honoured to receive the Order of Australia Medal (OAM) announced on the King's Birthday. We thank all for the congratulation wishes that we received and acknowledge the help and assistance that we receive from organisations we are involved in and particularly from Beaconsfield Progress Assoc members.

Our Meetings are now held on the third Tuesday of each alternate month commencing February 2025 but there are no meetings in January and December. Meetings commence at 7.30pm at the Beaconsfield Community Complex. All local residents, business owners and others keen to be kept informed on matters predominately related to Beaconsfield are welcome to attend the meetings.

Beacon Hills Ward Councillors' Report



Safety **Upgrade** for **Fieldstone Boulevard**

Council has completed road safety upgrades on Fieldstone Boulevard from Beaconsfield-Emerald Rd to Holm Park Rd.

This project was

part of the Australian Government's 2024 - 2025 Black Spot Program and Council's Local Area Traffic Improvement program.

Works included:

- The installation of three new flat top road humps between Scenic Dr and Harbour St
- The installation of two pairs of asphalt speed cushions to the east of Timberside Dr, between Northview Ct and Gumview Ct
- Kerb and channel realignment work
- Minor concrete footpath work
- Lighting upgrades at 6 locations

In mid-2023, Council completed community consultation regarding the installation of local area traffic management devices/speed humps, otherwise referred to as speed humps.

This consultation was prompted by a review of road safety in the area, which identified significant risk due to the number of reported crashes, resident requests and the traffic and speed data.



Street lighting upgrades for Beaconsfield

Decorative street light fittings in Beaconsfield will be

replaced with energy efficient LED light fittings as part of a staged mercury vapour street light replacement program.



Approximately 400 existing 80-watt mercury vapour decorative streetlights are scheduled to be replaced over the next nine months by Ausnet's approved contractors.

The replacement of these fittings has been prioritised as the globes they use have been banned under the international Minamata convention due to the mercury they contain.

There are several benefits associated with the new LED fittings, which are approximately 80% more energy efficient, provide improved lighting quality and visibility, with efficient technology that directs more light towards the street, and have lower maintenance costs.

Council has worked to find new and similar alternative lights that match the original street lighting design, with enhanced functionality. The replacement light fittings are of a similar style to the existing lights.

Lights will be replaced in the following locations:

- · Berwick Views and Bowman's Track Estates, Beaconsfield.
- · Panorama Estate, Beaconsfield.
- · Coach House Lane, Beaconsfield.

The LED street lighting upgrade program started in 2022, with more than 1,200 mercury vapour lights replaced across the shire to date. The upgrade program is funded by Council and AusNet services.

Proposed Road Discontinuance and Transfer of council land



Council is proposing to discontinue a section of unused road located at Trythall Street in Beaconsfield and transfer to DEECA at a nominal cost of \$1.

An application for Council to discontinue a 375m2 section of unmade road and request to have this transferred to DEECA was received by DEECA the abutting landowner.

Council has determined that the 375m2 section of Trythall Street will be sold to an abutting landowner, being the Department of Energy, Environment and Climate Action (DEECA) for \$1, understanding the future benefit derived from its incorporation within the future Cardinia Creek Parklands project - www.engage.vic.gov.au/CardiniaCkParklands

Join 9pm Routine to Deter Theft



Cardinia Shire residents are encouraged to take proactive steps to secure their homes and vehicles as theft continues to be a pressing concern in the shire.

According to the Crime Statistics Agency Victoria,

the most common crime reported in Cardinia Shire is stealing from cars, often occurring right outside homes. Data from Victoria Police reveals that 57% of stolen vehicles were left unlocked or showed no signs of forced entry, highlighting that thieves typically look for easy targets.

In response to this alarming trend, Victoria Police have launched the 9PM Routine. This community initiative, supported by Cardinia Shire Council, aims to remind residents to secure their properties and prevent theft.

Thieves are opportunistic and look for easy targets. Residents can help deter thieves by locking away belongings, keeping items out of sight, and ensuring that all doors and windows are securely locked.

The 9 PM routine encourages the community to make it a habit to:

- Collect valuables from your car
- Lock your car
- Lock your home (doors and windows)
- · Lock your garage
- · Park in a secure and well-lit area

By making the 9PM routine a regular habit, residents can help protect their property and contribute to a safer community.

Community vigilance is crucial in maintaining safety in Cardinia Shire. Residents are encouraged to report any suspicious activity. In case of an emergency, call 000. For non-urgent matters, contact Victoria Police at 131 444 or report your observations online. Additionally, anyone with information that could assist in resolving a crime is urged to make an anonymous report to Crime Stoppers on 1800 333 000.

Mayor Jack Kowazik welcomed everyone on behalf of the Cardinia Shire.


The Cranbourne Salvation Army Recorder Ensemble played the National Anthem and God Save the

John William Dawson ANZAC Memorial Address

Researched by Penny Harris Jennings. Read by Andrew Brewster.

The dedication today is soldier, John William Dawson, Service No VX34391, Australian Army WW2.

John William Dawson was born on a fine and bright day at St Andrews Private Hospital in Brighton Victoria, 10 April 1919 to parents Gregory and Louise Dawson.



His parents and sisters affectionately called him Jack. The Dawson family moved quite often in Jack's formative years as his father, Gregory, was a station master. Jack spent his school years in the western district towns of Berriwillock, Dunnstown, Garvoc and Derrinallum. In 1934 the family including Jack, then aged 15, moved to Welshpool, South Gippsland. In subsequent years the Dawsons came to Berwick Station and then Beaconsfield.

Jack residing at the Young Men's Christian

Association (YMCA) in Northcote enlisted 3 July 1940 at Royal Park Melbourne. He trained in both Mt Martha and Seymour before departing from Sydney for Singapore on 3 October 1941 with the rank Sapper in the 2/10th Field Company, Royal Australian Engineers. In February 1942 Jack was "wounded shell shocked" and on 26 February he was listed as a Prisoner of War. He had been captured by the Japanese and sent to work on the Thai Burma Railway. During the construction of the railway more than 16,000 prisoners died of sickness, malnutrition and exhaustion.

Jack worked in the poor conditions until he succumbed to dysentery 24 April 1943. Tragically several months after Jack's death his parents received an "All's well" postcard from Jack that he was in Japanese hands. His parents were relieved

because the last news they had received was the that he had been wounded just prior to the fall of Singapore.

Jack's death notification to his parents was not confirmed until 1945. In a Dandenong Journal newspaper article, the journalist wrote the following:

Death Of Beaconsfield Soldier In Thailand

district residents goes out to Mr. and Mrs. G. Dawson, of the Beaconsfield railway station, in the sad news, just to hand, that their boy, Spr. Jack Dawson died back in 1943 while a P.O.W. in Thailand. Jack was a fine lad, who will be deeply mourned, not only by his parents and sisters (Beryl and Rena) but by a wide circle of friends who had learnt to appreciate his worth. In giving up his life for his country he only lived up to the traditions that were part of his make-up.

His parents finally placed their sad and poignant death notice on the 25 April 1945, exactly 80 years ago this ANZAC day.

"A tribute of love and affection to our dear son and brother John, and to his gallant comrades of 2/10th field Company, Royal Australia Engineers".

"Loved in life, missed in death, beautiful memories are all we have left"

Jack is forever immortalised here on our Beaconsfield War Memorial.

Rest in peace, Jack.

Railway House & LXRP Update By Fran Healy



In the Beaconsfield Banner 2022 Summer edition an LEVEL article I wrote regarding CROSSING the Victorian Government acquiring and demolishing the Railway House in Beaconsfield Ave said

"Imagine our town when we no longer see the red letterbox with number 20 on it and smile"

The intervening years saw us campaign hard with the community and eventually save the Railway House from demolition as the level crossing in Station St was removed and a road bridge constructed over the top.

The House has stayed empty and silent over the past two years as machines, workers, site offices etc. were busy all around it. Part of the rear of the house was removed to allow for the building of the bridge as site plans had to be altered but it has been carefully repaired and renovated.

The bunya tree has continued to stand tall, surveying the construction that was taking place all around it, kangaroos ventured timidly out at dusk to inspect progress as the train commuters searched for parking in nearby streets as car parking spaces were drastically reduced.

It has been a busy, noisy, tiring two years but I am happy to report that they have packed up and moved out as traffic now rolls across the bridge, the site offices are gone and the workers have moved their trucks and tools to other areas. The footpath again allows students to walk directly from the Beaconsfield Station to SFX and the extra car parking, with room left over, accommodates the commuters and nearby residents have their streets quiet and safe again.

Which brings me back to my initial comment about the red letterbox. I am so happy to report that on 21 May, at a small LXRP event organised by Michael Galea (Member for South-Eastern Metro), that red letterbox was officially handed over to Ian Cole, who is the previous owner of the Railway House. It was his renovations and restoration that made the house the feature of Beaconsfield that it is today. He especially had a very special attachment to the red letterbox as it was a gift to him with much sentimental value and we can all agree that it looked very much at home there. However, a request that

Ian be given back the letterbox received a positive answer and while Ian had made quite sure the letterbox was well and truly safely embedded in the ground LXRP workers used their expertise and machines to not only dig it up and help load it into lan's trailer, but to follow him home and unload at the other end!

The day, while happy for Ian and his wife Yvonne, was also bittersweet. He asked if he could have a look inside the house and as the impressive front door swung open it revealed empty rooms, depressions in the carpets where family furniture had stood, dust on surfaces, gritty windows and an air of neglect. It looked unloved and sad. However, the bones of it, and lan's craftmanship and his fine attention to detail stood out. He quietly wandered around walking down memory lane regaling us all with stories of his renovations. Yvonne was the gardener but it is now overgrown and strewn with branches.

The future of the Railway House is still undecided. It is owned by the Government but would be a wonderful community asset for the Cardinia Council. It must retain its heritage standing and be appreciated and valued for all it has seen in Beaconsfield over the past 150 years. It is a touchstone for our township and a survivor. We do not want it to go to those who will not care for it, or would want to change it. We want it to be preserved for future generations.

Being there for the handover of the letterbox made me feel like we had come full circle. Our fight to save the Railway House and the bunya tree started with the symbol of the red letterbox, and we finish as it



makes its way back to the man who truly deserves it. It has done its iob and the Railway House begins a new chapter going forward. We see the old and new together which is fitting.



Conservation at APS Cardinia Region By Alex Smart OAM

In the early days of APS, and our group, the objectives were to find plants able to be propagated and cultivated. Members introduced showy Australian plants into private gardens and Bush gardens became popular. Few nurseries grew or sold Australian Plants so our early members started an annual plant sale on a member's property. The plant sales have continued resulting in thousands of plants being introduced to family homes and properties increasing biodiversity by attracting, possibly millions of birds and insects. Now numerous indigenous nurseries supply plants for private and public projects.

Members continue to concentrate their interests on Australian plants with the connections with birds recognised as inseparable.

Victoria's bird emblem, the critically endangered Helmeted Honeyeater Lichenostomus melanops cassidix, 'HeHo' for short, had occurred along the Cardinia Creek with the last positive sighting in 1981 after which they became extinct in the district

leaving the only remaining wild population, at that time, in the Yellingbo Nature Conservation Reserve and a conservation breeding program based at Healesville Sanctuary, Zoos Victoria from 1989.

The Cardinia Creek is an important waterway flowing from what is now the Cardinia Reservoir descending to the flat lands below Beaconsfield then across the Koo Wee Rup swamp into Westernport Bay near Tooradin.

Late in 1867 Fredrick McCoy, then Director of the new National Museum of Natural History and Geology in Melbourne, collected both the Helmeted Honeyeater and Leadbeater's Possum at Bass River on Westernport. In 1971 both these creatures became fauna emblems for Victoria.

In 2014, the APS-Cardinia Region Committee invited Bob Anderson, long term President of Friends of the Helmeted Honeyeater Inc. to speak to our group. That did not happen because discussions evolved

into an idea to hold a public meeting to examine the feasibility of reintroducing HeHo's to the Cardinia Creek. A major concern was that if a catastrophic fire swept through the Yellingbo Reserve it could wipe out the only remaining wild population. On 15th April 2015, with assistance from Cardinia Shire, a public meeting was held at Beaconsfield. More than 100 people attended and their support for a trial reintroduction was unanimous.

The committee approached the Helmeted Honeyeater Recovery Team and arrangements were made for them to visit, and make a tentative assessment of the habitat. Ian Chisholm worked out a route and opened the Beaconsfield Conservation Reserve and Parks Victoria opened the Cardinia Creek Parkland and pointed out how wonderfully the habitat had recovered from the Ash Wednesday bushfires. Their response was encouraging and some of their members returned for a second tour after which we were told Cardinia Creek was their highest priority for a trial reintroduction. However, dealing with a critically endangered creature there were many hurdles still to be overcome.

The HeHo Recovery Team engaged independent environmental consultants to conduct a detailed habitat surveys which confirmed our opinions and nominated the best site for a trial reintroduction in a well vegetated and remote site on the Cardinia Creek. APS Cardinia Region members were delighted.

Between 2001 and 2012, releases of captive bred HeHo's were made in the Bunyip State Forest. After a decade of releases, birds failed to establish, yet the Recovery Team learned guite a lot. Meanwhile, another site at the O'Shannassy Catchment near East Warburton was identified as the most suitable site for a release. This site was selected based off a number of criteria, containing dense thickets of Coprosma quadrifida for HeHo nesting, limited deer disturbance/activity, excellent site security and was a former location of the Gippsland Yellow-tufted Honeyeater (L. m. gippslandicus). Geneticist partners on the program, at Monash University, suggested if Yellow-tufted Honeyeaters were still present, this would only further support the Helmeted Honeyeater Genetic Rescue Program by mixing genes to produce stronger HeHo's. By now a small population has become established of 40-50 birds. A second population in the

BNC Children's Room

Enrolments for permanent childcare places in 2026 are now being taken. We understand how tricky it can be to commit to a spot until later in the year when kindergarten preferences or other plans are more certain, so you can put your child's name down for a session and delay paying the \$20 nonrefundable deposit until September. Getting in early is the best way to guarantee care on your preferred days.



We always have a little bit of movement in our Occasional Care enrolments throughout the year, and places are offered to those waiting. Contact us at any time to enquire about availability or be added to our wait lists for sessions that are currently full. Each group runs from 8.30am – 4.30pm but families are free to come and go at any time within the session to suit their own schedules. The fee in 2025 is \$91.20 per child over 18 months, and eligible families are entitled to the Child Care Subsidy (CCS) which will reduce out-of-pocket costs. The expected fee for each child per session in 2026 is \$94.80.

There are always fun, topical and colourful activities happening in our Children's Room and we invite visitors to come and see if our service will fit your family's needs. This year National Reconciliation Week was held from 27 May to 3 June. Our Occasional Care children engaged in thoughtful discussions about Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander cultures and the significance of reconciliation.



Playgroup on Tuesdays with Alicia is very popular and our 9.00am session is currently full. We have a wait list for starting a second group at 11.30am. Parents or carers stay with their children to participate in the activities that Alicia sets up. It's a great opportunity for your child to learn through play and socialising and an opportunity for you to meet other families from the community. We are currently brainstorming about some exciting new initiatives for next year with shorter, smaller group sessions focussed on selected educational growth areas such as art, music, motor skills and physical activities for younger children to do with their parents. If there's some facilitated activities that you would like to see offered for you and your child, we'd love to hear from you!

I am happy to report that the boom gates at Station Street, Beaconsfield, have been permanently removed. Since March, the level crossing has been removed, with traffic flowing across the new McKenna Drive bridge.

The dismantling of the boom gates is part of the final works on the project, alongside the planting of 80 Australian

native and indigenous trees and 75,000 plants. I want to thank everyone for their patience throughout this project.

In other news, the sod has been turned at Upper Beaconsfield Recreation Reserve, marking the beginning of works to construct a new pavilion with upgraded facilities and modern amenities. The Council and the State Government are jointly funding this project, which will deliver modern, accessible facilities for the local community, sporting groups and scouts. I look forward to following its progress.

Among the various measures in the 2025-26 Victorian State Budget focused on providing cost-of-living support for families and households, I would like to take this opportunity to highlight the Community Pharmacist Program.

After a successful pilot, I am glad to see the Government making the program permanent and further expanding the role of local pharmacists in delivering healthcare to the community. This initiative will deliver free consultations for 22 health conditions to local communities via participating pharmacists. Victoria is the only State to provide free consultations for these health services, including:

Acute nausea and vomiting, Acne, Asthma, Uncomplicated UTI, Atopic dermatitis, Smoking cessation, Chronic Obstructive Pulmonary Disease (COPD), Hypertension, Ear infections, Travel medicines, Shingles, Type 2 diabetes, Oral Contraceptive Pill resupply, Reflux, Psoriasis, and Smoking Cessation.

I believe this program is a real positive step, being able to go to a pharmacist for a free consultation will help locals receive the care they need without an additional cost or time barrier of setting up a GP appointment.





wild was a massive step to avoid the extinction of the HeHo.

There were more reasons for delays until finally APS Cardinia Region was advised that a release could be made in autumn 2025 subject to the availability of sufficient captive bred birds.

Early in May, 21 captive bred HeHo's were released in part of their former territory to create, if successful, a 3rd population in a natural habitat. Ian Chisholm and I were privileged to be invited to attend the release. HeHo's are quite social and when released they grouped together before finding they could forage for their natural foods. Zoos Victoria's Helmeted Honeyeater Field Officer, Dr Nick Bradsworth, is managing this release, monitoring the birds and providing supplementary food.

While APS-Cardinia Region raised the idea of a trial reintroduction in our area greater credit is due to Friends of the Helmeted Honeyeater who since 1989 have tirelessly worked improving habitat in the Yellingbo Conservation Reserve and through their

indigenous plant nursery enabling many locals to revegetate local properties.

Bruce Quin, Senior Ornithologist at the Department of Energy, **Environment and Climate Action** (DEECA) who has worked with HeHo's for more than 30 years.

Zoos Victoria's Karina Cartwright for leading the conservation

breeding program of HeHo's at Healesville Sanctuary, along with wildlife field ecologists Dr Dan Harley, and more recently Dr Nick Bradsworth taking major roles.

It may take some years before this trial reintroduction could be considered successful. Spring will determine if released birds can pair off, nest and successfully breed. That would be a huge reward to many people involved

over so many years. And for these very special birds after more than 160 years of their habitat being plundered, will they have the resilience to reestablish in their former territory?
