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President's Report



Welcome to this Summer edition of the Beaconsfield Banner. The Banner is available on our BPA website www.beaconsfield.org.au and printed copies are available in the town at businesses

including the Beaconsfield Post Office and Beaconsfield Pharmacy. The Beaconsfield Progress Association (BPA) provides a link between the residents, businesses, and governing authorities predominately our local government Cardinia Shire Council.

Our achievements in 2025 reflect on the work done by our Committee, members and others co-opted. Thanks to Penny Harris Jennings for all the research work that she does for us especially this year on Beaconsfield WWII Soldiers. Congratulations to Penny for her book on the Salvation Army home at Pakenham which was recently released.

The future of the Railway House which is owned by the State Government is still undecided. Part of the rear of the house was removed to allow the building of the new overpass. The house and Bunya tree need to be retained for heritage purposes and would be a valuable community asset for Cardinia Shire. It was great to see the red letterbox being handed back to a sentimental Ian Cole, a previous owner and the renovator of the Railway House.

A Remembrance Day service was held on 11 November at the Beaconsfield War Memorial site at Bonette Reserve. Those attending were gathered to remember all servicemen and women who served in all conflicts. We remember that at 11am on 11 November 1918 the guns on the Western Front fell silent after more than four years of continuous warfare. Originally known as Armistice Day it was renamed Remembrance Day after WWII to commemorate those who were killed in both world wars. Today, the loss of lives from all wars is commemorated on Remembrance Day. We will remember them. Lest we forget.

The Beaconsfield *Carols by the Creek* will be held on Sunday 21 December at Bob Burgess Reserve. The carols are organised by Beaconsfield Baptist Church and the BPA and is a wonderful community event. Organisers are hoping for fine weather for the family friendly event.

A Grant of \$8,476 has been received from the Department of Veterans Affairs to enable plaques to be made for WWII Soldiers. Now that the Funds have been received, we are able to proceed with the making and installation of the plaques in early 2026.

A Grant of \$1,000 has been received from Cardinia Shire Council for Wellbeing/Support to enable Christmas trees and some decorations to be installed in Beaconsfield. This project will involve the local community and schools as in recent years.

APA Group has been conducting essential maintenance work on the T60 Longford to Dandenong Pipeline in Beaconsfield Park. The works involve excavation, pipeline repairs and site cleanup. The project works are currently on hold due to APA assessing the potential to relocate the stormwater drain. The drain runs from Beaconsfield/Emerald Road to Cardinia Creek. Once these works have been completed, the area that is used by the public will be larger and will be re-instated at least to what was there previously.

During 2025 BPA has produced the *Beaconsfield Banner* every four months. The *Beaconsfield Banner* is available in the printed format from outlets in the town as well as digitally on our website and mobile phones. Thanks to Robert Cooper for his work as Editor. Our Facebook page continues to be popular and gets many hits. To assist with our printing costs, our Association received a Grant of \$900 from Cardinia Shire Council.

Level Crossing Removal Project complete



The LXRP Beaconsfield project has now come to completion with the last element of works being the new shared use path on Kenilworth Avenue which lifts the path above the 1 in 50-year flood levels and the

project has completed the planting of over 70,000 new plant species including trees, grasses, ground covers and climbers and aquatic plants.

The ownership and future of the Station Masters House is still with the State Government for a decision on its future ownership. Council has completed a new Heritage Citation for the property after the small renovations that were carried out to the house due to the proximity to the new bridge. The Bunya Bunya Pine has had an arborist report completed showing it's in good health following all the works around it over the last 2 years.

LXRP intend to have the Station carpark fully open prior to Christmas and Council are carrying out some traffic counts around the station precinct including several local streets to compare the traffic volumes and parking prior to the project starting and will use the data to inform if any other works or signage are required to assist with parking and motorists' behaviours.

The project has a 2-year defects and maintenance period into mid 2027 which includes all landscaping areas and Council will work closely with the LXRP project team to ensure a high quality and establishment of plants and trees is achieved which will give a positive completion to this project.

Green waste drop off events

Take advantage of our FREE green waste drop-off event this December - the perfect way to freshen up your outdoor space and make the most of the warmer weather.

This event accepts residential amounts of green waste including garden prunings, tree branches and trunks (up to 30 centimetres wide and 1 metre long), weeds, grass clippings, leaves, and flowers.

Cardinia Shire Pedestrian and Bicycle Strategy review

Cardinia Shire Council is reviewing the Pedestrian and Bicycle Strategy to improve how residents walk, cycle, and move throughout the shire. This review of the Pedestrian and Bicycle Strategy aims to create safer, more connected, and accessible paths and trails across the shire, ensuring a vibrant and active lifestyle for all.

The community is invited to participate in this review by sharing their experiences and ideas through an online survey and an interactive map highlighting areas for improvement or showcasing great places to walk or ride. Whether you are a regular walker, an avid cyclist, or a nature enthusiast, your insights will play a crucial role in shaping the future of our active transport network. Council is looking to understand which infrastructure works well, what needs improvement, and what new connections or upgrades residents would like to see.

The review will focus on shared paths and trails, both existing and proposed, facilitating informal walking and cycling for recreation and transport.

This initial ideas-gathering consultation will assist Council in developing a new draft Pedestrian and Bicycle Strategy, which will be presented to the community for further feedback in early 2026.

The final strategy will serve as a guiding framework for Council's future planning and investment in walking and cycling infrastructure, ultimately enhancing connections and promoting a healthier lifestyle for all residents in Cardinia Shire.

Summer is upon us again and it is imperative to those on the rural fringe have a working fire plan.

A detailed plan with ALL members of the family familiar with its substance so if

threatened by fire you are able to act quickly and calmly to ensure everyone is safe.

Questions that you need to consider are as follows:

- · Am I at risk from bush or grass fires?
- Do I know how fire behaves? Answers to this can be found online under CFA fire plan.

It is important to seriously decide whether you should stay or leave.

• If I stay, am I prepared to face radiant heat from the fire in defending my property?

Radiant heat is the number one killer in fires. It is the heat that will meet you if you venture outside when a fire burns through your property. As a firefighter I have experienced that many times in my time, and I can assure you it is terrifying regardless of how often you have been exposed to this situation.

It is safer to leave early on a hot windy day.

Remember the following 40-10-40 rule:

Forty degrees, 10% humidity, and 40 km winds means you need to be elsewhere if you have a rural or urban rural property.

So preparation is your companion and decision based on possible outcomes will see you and your family enjoy the summer season.

Gwen worked there as the cleaner, but she was so much more. She knew all the students and their parents and the teachers by name. She was friendly and very caring and was someone you could always talk to, and you knew she would look out for your children. She finally retired from the school after 24 years. In her memory the school has established the Gwen Neve Garden.

Gwen lived in the town and was known and loved by everyone. After she retired Gwen was still active and joined the Beaconsfield Neighbourhood Centre. She organised the mid-way group for ladies and in 2005 was

nominated for a Victorian Seniors Achievers Award. As a finalist she and her family attended

Government House for a ceremony where she was presented with an award and certificate. She was also nominated for the Cardinia Shire Stan Henwood Award.

Audrey Dodson

Audrey was a longtime resident of Officer. She was a dedicated primary school teacher and taught at many schools in the Cardinia Shire, including Pakenham Consolidated School and Beaconsfield Primary. While she was at Beaconsfield, she researched the information about the centenary of the school and helped organise the centenary celebrations in 1990. She wrote the book Beaconsfield Primary School 1890-1990, the school and its district.

She had a passion for local history and is best known for her work with Berwick Pakenham Historical

Society as Secretary. She loved researching and collecting local history and sharing her knowledge with visiting school groups. In 2022 she published the book Pakenham Then and Now which is a photographic record of Pakenham. It is full of wonderful old photographs with recent pictures beside them.

Audrey was Secretary for 37 years at BPHS and has left an amazing legacy.

Our community is so thankful for all she has contributed and her passions for teaching and local history.

Beaconsfield Hall

A group of local residents met in 1904 with the vision of building a public hall in Beaconsfield. A committee was formed for the management of the hall, which was to provide a gathering place for recreation and education. The agreed location was a prominent position on the Princes Highway opposite where the War Memorial now stands. The hall with

a free library would be most advantageous for the community and fundraising for the hall proceeded. The local builder James Adamson was the carpenter of choice and the construction of the building commenced. In July 1906 the Premier of Victoria, Thomas

Bent attended the

opening. He gave praise to the community for the enthusiasm of such an important public building to service all the residents' communal activities.

During the First World War there were many functions in support of the district soldiers, there were numerous occasions of fundraising and the hall was the venue to welcome home all that returned from war service in 1919.

The hall provided for the residents a multipurpose functional building which included a free library. Over the years there were many different uses including weddings, balls, bazaars, a place of worship and one of the rooms was used for a time as a baby health centre.

In the 1930's the hall had a cinematographic machine, which was a welcome entertainment. After 1937 the hall was sold to the "Crown", the reason given was that it allowed the committee to apply for government grants.

The Country Roads Board in the mid 1940's began its deliberation regarding the widening of the Princes Highway; the predicament of the hall position was continually discussed over the following years.

Despite this, in 1957 the hall committee received a subsidy for extensions to the supper room. The robust discussion on relocation continued, in 1963 the Beaconsfield Progress Association continued the discourse during the March meeting, numerous committee members, councillors and concerned local residents debated the future possibilities for the building. A popular view during this time was the

possibility of moving the hall to the Recreation reserve. A motion was passed that a letter be sent to the Country Roads Board requesting the future planning regarding the highway and its impact concerning the hall.

Despite community protest the hall in

the 1970's was sold by tender to Mr H D Allen of Arthurs Creek. This unfortunately meant the hall was demolished instead of the original preferred choice of moving the hall to another location, as desired by the residents. The hall committee received a cash payment to build a new Beaconsfield Hall to better service the growing town.

Without a community venue the obvious need was recognised by the local council. The old Pakenham Library was subsequently moved to Beaconsfield next to the scout hall in Beaconsfield Avenue. This provided a necessary place for local groups, which included the BPA, Neighbourhood Centre classes, and a crèche.

A new hall was not built on the previous model, instead the new Beaconsfield Community Complex was built in O'Neil Road in 2004.

We are gathered here today to remember all servicemen and women and all those who served and in all conflicts.

Today on 11th November we remember that at 11am on 11th November 1918, the guns on the Western Front fell silent after more than four years of continuous warfare. The Germans called for an armistice (suspension of fighting) in order to secure a peace

settlement. They accepted the allied terms of unconditional surrender.

The 11th hour of the 11th Day of the 11th month attained a special significance in the post war years. It became universally associated with the remembrance of those who had died in war.

Originally known as Armistice Day, it was renamed Remembrance Day after World War Two to commemorate those who were killed in both World Wars. Today the loss of lives from all

Save the Beaconsfield Reservoir in Parliament

The Save the Beaconsfield Reservoir Petition has been tabled in Parliament.

It will be of interest to hundreds of Beaconsfield residents who signed the Petition to Parliament, that the recent "Save the Beaconsfield Reservoir Petition to Parliament" has been handed to Brad Battin MP, to be tabled in Parliament. The Petition requested the Government to "Save Beaconsfield Reservoir

of the Beaconsfield Banner, and this article gives closure to those who signed it and are interested in its progress. The petition has now been tabled in the Victorian Legislative Assembly. We await further news regarding its reception in Parliament. The point of the petition will be not be lost on those residents and their children, who still live locally, or have moved into rural areas of Beaconsfield, Upper Beaconsfield and Officer, and are aware of the catastrophic Ash Wednesday bush fires that occurred on February 16, 1983.

Our petition was supported by the broad community through the Pakenham Gazette, many local businesses, at market stalls, shows, or signing the petition outside supermarkets. The petition had been gathering signatures for approximately 2 years and was jointly supported in the local community by approximately 1,900 members of the Save the Beaconsfield Reservoir Action Group (SBRAG) on Facebook, and the 'Officer and District Community Association' (ODCA) membership.

It has been signed by an astounding 4,000 Victorians from all across the State, with the largest representation being in Cardinia Shire. Our SBRAG Committee decided that it was an appropriate time to hand it over to the Leader of the Opposition, Brad

Battin MP, who has been a long-term supporter of saving Beaconsfield Reservoir, so that the issue would get discussed in Parliament. Brad has been committed to saving the reservoir and its beautiful bushland as a public park for many years, so that it can be enjoyed by future generations. Despite the Pakenham electorate encompassing Beaconsfield Reservoir, Brad Battin MP is the member for Berwick, and it is the adjacent electorate, just a

couple of kilometres from the boundary of Beaconsfield Reservoir. He was the Member for Gembrook before electoral boundaries were changed at the last elections.

Our campaign objectives for the Petition to

Parliament were to obtain community awareness, consultation and transparent discussion on the future of Beaconsfield Reservoir's 525 Megalitres of water that had been left in the decommissioned Beaconsfield Reservoir since it was decommissioned in 1988. The Petition wished to draw to the attention of the Legislative Assembly:

- That the Victorian State Government and Melbourne Water have kept the Beaconsfield Reservoir locked away from public access for decades, unbeknown to the majority of local residents. Although draining has currently paused, to the best of our knowledge they are still planning to drain most of the reservoir, demolish a substantial part of the dam wall, and continue keeping it locked up.
- The petitioners therefore request that the Legislative Assembly ask the Victorian State Government and Melbourne Water to undertake the following:
- The Beaconsfield Reservoir's current water level of 8.85 metres be maintained.
- The historic dam wall at current height be retained.
- The surrounding parkland be opened to public access.





Funding & Advocacy



We are currently advocating for the State Government to increase the Neighbourhood House Coordination Program (NHCP) hourly rate by 25% in the 2026 Victorian Budget.

The NHCP is the state government program that largely funds our operations. Funding is allocated based on hours of coordination and assists with employing a coordinator and related costs.

However, Neighbourhood Houses have faced rising costs, increasing community need and an erosion of core funding. Current funding no longer covers the true cost of employing a manager for the required funded hours - let alone other operational costs. Nearly half of all Houses in Victoria have recorded a loss for two years running.

Furthermore, 92% of the funded positions are filled by women, who are now under extreme pressure to cut corners or volunteer their time in the workplace. They are doing unpaid labour to cover the lack of funding for this essential community service. Without sustainable funding, our doors will eventually close. We hope that this important message is being received and acted upon by the relevant ministers in the Department of Families, Fairness & Housing (DFFH).

Managers of Neighbourhood Houses in the Cardinia Shire Council Cluster, along with other sector representatives, recently met at our Centre with the Hon. Brad Battin MP to discuss the campaign. We trust that the Leader of the Opposition will support our budget submission and help ensure funding reflects the true value of our work.

We're thrilled that Cardinia Shire Council has formally backed our campaign at their October meeting where the following motion was carried:

That Council:

- 1. Writes to Hon. Ros Spence, Minister for Carers and Volunteers, to express Council's support for Neighbourhood Houses Victoria's advocacy appeal to the State Government for more support for staff and the sector overall through the following, requesting:
- a. funding for Neighbourhood Houses (Neighbourhood House Coordination Program) increases by 25% ensure our community is provided with essential support and connection,

b. an additional 25 houses receive ongoing funding who currently do not,

c. in principle support regarding the development of a fund for the establishment of 5 neighbourhood houses per year over 4 years in Growth Areas subject to Council's

review of its Neighbourhood House Policy.

2. Notes the importance of the eight Neighbourhood houses operating in Cardinia Shire to the social and community fabric of the Shire and thank the staff and volunteers who run them.

The Metro Tunnel and five new stations are open! You may have seen that over 70,000 people travelled on the metro tunnel on opening day. It's a truly historic moment for our city.

Passengers on the Pakenham line can now travel directly through the tunnel, with 240 extra weekly services running between

Westall and West Footscray during the day on weekdays and weekends. This is on top of the regular Pakenham line services through the City Loop.

From February 1st, the Big Switch will fully integrate the Metro Tunnel into the Cranbourne, Pakenham and Sunbury lines, adding thousands of services each week and freeing up space in the Loop so more trains can run more often.

And the good news keeps coming - public transport is free on weekends until February 1st to celebrate the opening and help families enjoy summer before school goes back.

The Metro Tunnel will make it easier to reach more parts of the city, from workplaces to hospitals, schools, events and services. Locals will see more frequent services, shorter waits and faster trips.

I'm also pleased to update you on important reforms the Government has recently introduced to strengthen public safety.

The Allan Labor Government's Adult Time for Violent Crime reforms will crack down on serious youth offending, including home invasions and assaults, by treating offenders over fourteen as adults for sentencing. This means tougher penalties and greater likelihood of jail time for the most violent crimes.

• The reserve be turned into a public park, with facilities provided to enhance the accessibility and useability of the area.

Save the Beaconsfield Reservoir Action Group have tried to avoid a political path to resolve this impasse with Melbourne Water. Our SBRAG Committee wished to consult with all political groups and represent all residents, regardless of political affiliation, because catastrophic bush fires such as the Ash Wednesday bushfires, the Black Saturday bushfires and the Bunyip State Forest bushfires, don't respect political boundaries. As locals, we know that another bush fire will inevitably be the consequence for all residents of the local communities, including Beaconsfield, unless decisive action to save the water in Beaconsfield Reservoir is undertaken!

Our primary objectives have remained to protect the local community, the environment and wildlife, and we have been open in wanting to have commonsense discussions to engage with the State Government's Ministers for Water and the Environment, and of course, Melbourne Water's

Beaconsfield Dam Project Team. Unfortunately, all of our attempts seem to end on deaf ears, because discussion and consultation are not considered an option by the government. Despite our sincere efforts to promote meaningful negotiation, the Ministers and Melbourne Water have the opinion that negotiations cannot go ahead! How bizarre!

We trust that there will be a renewed interest in discussing the future of Beaconsfield Reservoir and its importance as a very large 525 Megalitres of useable water for fire-fighting. In this period of Climate Change, it is vital to save this resource for all local residents of Beaconsfield Upper, Beaconsfield and Officer, and to ensure this crucial water supply remains. The local population need this water resource as a future public park where families can visit to enjoy the bushland and the reservoir, but also critically as a resource which can save lives, homes, the environment and wildlife by preventing future disasters on the scale of recent bush fires!

We're also increasing the maximum sentence for adults who recruit children into violent gang activity. Those who involve a child in serious offences like aggravated home invasion will face life in prison. This is what the community has called for -and we're delivering it. Everyone deserves to feel safe in their own home.

In addition, those who harm or threaten retail, fast food, hospitality or transport workers will now face penalties of up to five years' jail. These reforms protect customer-facing workers and ensure they can do their jobs safely.


